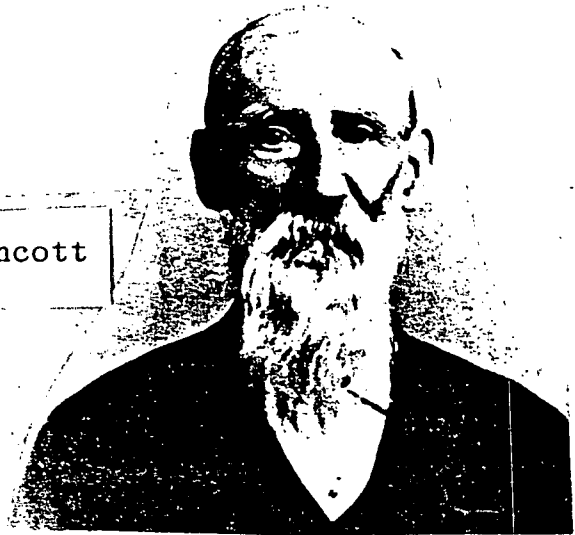

OBITUARY of Dr. Thomas YARNOLD

From Newspaper clipping dated 17 March 1890, paper unknown.

Dr. Thomas YARNOLD was born in Monmonshire, England, on March 12, 1807. His parents being well off he was enabled to get a good education and indulged in the sports of the country, and being fond of following the hounds became an expert rider. This accomplishment stood him good stead when later in life he became a surgeon to some mining work in S. Wales. He graduated at King College and married a Miss Louisa THACHER by whom he had three children.

At the time of the coronation of Queen Victoria in 1837 he had an excellent practice in London. At the outbreak of the Crimean war he entered Her Majesty's army as a surgeon and served with great energy and credit. His wife having died he married Miss Mary Ann WATKINS in 1857 left England with his three children, and after some travel in this country settled in 1860 on a farm near Clinton, Douglas county, Kansas.

He soon developed a practice in and about Clinton and kept it by prompt attention and an enthusiastic devotion to his profession. In 1870 he moved to Lawrence and added to his practice many patients from among the English residents. Gradually with advancing years he confined himself more and more to office practice until in 1883, when he gave up altogether. Later he divided his time pretty nearly equally among the three daughters by his second wife. Soon after coming to Lawrence he and his family became active members of Trinity church and to his energy and foresight in the management of its finances the church is greatly indebted for success in tiding over its hardest and grasshopper times.

He was of a gently and kindly disposition, an excellent father and the kindest of husbands; was always glad to welcome his friends and those of his children at his home. He died at the age of 88, having enjoyed fifty years of active practice in his profession to which he was an honor. Mrs. Yarnold died in 1885. The doctor's five surviving children are Mrs. H.M. Sault, Las Vegas, N.M., E.L. Yarnold, Medford, Okla., Mrs. Anna M. Moyes, Lawrence, Kas. Mrs. F. M. Alexander, El Reno, Okla., and Mrs. T.A. Pollock, Kansas City Kansas.

GENERAL JOHN NEWTON ROBERTS

Submitted by David L. Snyder, Park Historian, Isle Royale National Park, 87 N. Ripley St., Houghton, MI 49931. Mr. Snyder informs us that around 1900 General ROBERTS built a summer home on Isle Royale, a wilderness area in Lake Superior in Michigan, about 15 miles from the Canadian mainland. He owned the property until 1919, at which time he sold both his Isle Royale cottage and his principal residence in Lawrence and moved to California. The cottage, compared to his Lawrence home (now known as the Castle Tea Room) is extremely modest. It has four bedrooms, a dining room, kitchen, living room with fireplace, and a large screened-in dining porch. By Isle Royale standards, it is the most substantial cottage. A large boat house where General ROBERTS kept his boat "Sylvia" collapsed in the 1950's from winter ice damage. If anyone has any further information, Mr. Snyder would appreciate hearing from you.

Letter to John N. Roberts and Reply

On July 25, 1892, F.G. ADAMS, Secretary of the Kansas State Historical Society, Topeka, Kansas, wrote to General J.N. ROBERTS at Topeka requesting certain biographical information to appear in a catalog index with historical materials. General ROBERTS furnished the following information:

John N. ROBERTS, former Adjutant-General of Kansas, a veteran of the Civil War and prominent citizen of Lawrence, is a native of Ohio, born in the Western Reserve, at Mecca, Trumbell County, July 3, 1838. He is of Scotch descent and a direct descendant of Major ROBERTS of the British Army, who was a Scotch Highlander and came to America in the seventeenth century. William ROBERTS, the paternal grandfather of General ROBERTS, was a soldier in the American Revolution, and served with the Hearing Dragoons, known as "Scotch Highlanders." The parents of General ROBERTS were John and Emaline (HOTCHKISS) ROBERTS, native of Hartford, Conn. His father was a manufacturer of engines and machinery in Ohio, and in his father's factory the son learned the trade of a machinist and engine maker. The business career of General ROBERTS has been that of a manufacturer. He obtained a fair common school education, and then learned his trade. He answered to the first call of President Lincoln for troops in the defense of the Union, and in April 1861, enlisted in the Nineteenth Ohio Infantry, for a term of ninety days, and served under the command of General McCLELLAN, in western Virginia, participating in the Battle of Rich Mountain and Beverly Ford. At the expiration of the ninety days his regiment was mustered out of the service, and then Mr. ROBERTS assisted in the organization of the Sixth Ohio Cavalry, which was mustered in the service, in October 1861 for a term of three years. He was commissioned First Lieutenant of Company G, of this regiment, and in August, 1863 was promoted to the captaincy of Company D, in the same regiment. In November 1864 he was commissioned Major of the regiment, serving in the Army of the Potomac. He was severely wounded at the Battle of Upperville, Virginia July 21, 1863, but remained with the army until November 12, 1864, when, by reason of the expiration of the term of enlistment and troubles arising from his wound, he was honorably discharged.

In October 1867 General ROBERTS married Miss Emily S. SUTLIFF at Warren, Ohio. She is a daughter of a lawyer at that place. Mr. and Mrs. ROBERTS have one daughter, Isabel, the wife of Mark E. OTIS of Chicago. In the summer of 1869 General ROBERTS came to Kansas and established his residence at Lawrence, where he has since resided. In business as a manufacturer he has achieved financial success and is numbered among the capable business men of the state, and in Lawrence he has one of the largest and most beautiful homes of the city. It is modern throughout, and is a model of architecture. In politics General ROBERTS has always been an ardent Republican. He served with credit in the Kansas Legislature in the regular session of 1885 and the special session of 1886. In 1889 he was appointed Adjutant-General of Kansas and this office he held for four years. In fraternal relations he is a Knight Templar Mason and Noble of the Mystic Shrine, and with his comrades in arms he is a member of the Grand Army of the Republic and of the Military Order of the Loyal Legion of the United States.

Manufacturing in Lawrence, Kansas 1854-1900, by Kenneth A. Middleton (University of Kansas, 1937). The following are excerpts taken from a much longer paper. Courtesy of Elizabeth M. Watkins Museum.

p.103: The woodenware factory of General J.N. ROBERTS, built in 1876 at the south end of the dam, used water power until 1879, in which year General ROBERTS traded buildings with the Pacific Flour Mills at Connecticut and Quincy (now Eleventh) Streets. Since the woodenware factory required steam anyway in the process of manufacture, it had not benefitted so much from the use of water-power, and by moving to the Quincy Street buildings it gained much-needed space.

p.155-157: In 1876, on the levee at the south end of the dam, a building was erected and equipped with a turning lathe, planing and splitting machines, and a large circular saw. This was the woodenware factory of General J.N. ROBERTS and Company. It manufactured berry baskets, butter platters, cheese boxes, broom handles, and packing boxes -- the latter in "knocked down" form: the pieces were out to size and could be assembled and quickly nailed together by the buyer. The business expanded rapidly and new machinery was installed every few years. When a Lawrence group was incorporated to manufacture the Randall wheat separator, General ROBERTS arranged to have the wood work done in his establishment, the iron work being furnished by KIMBALL Brothers.

By 1879 the woodenware works was already pressed for space, and in that year, as has already been mentioned, it traded buildings with the Pacific Mill, then owned by the McCONNELL brothers. In the new quarters on Quincy Street, the woodenware factory had more room but was no longer able to use the dam for power as it had done previously; inasmuch as steam was required for processing the wood, however, the fact that an engine now had to be installed was not regarded as a great disadvantage. Two years later the warehouse building was moved bodily to the new location. Business continued to flourish; carload upon carload of baskets and boxes were sent out of Lawrence. The number of berry baskets mounted to about two million annually, according to Andreas.

For raw material the concern used cottonwood and black walnut veneering, sometimes as much as three carloads of the latter weekly. In 1881 the enterprise was incorporated with \$50,000 authorized capital stock, and named the Kansas Basket Manufacturing Company.

Too frequently Lawrence was fated to lose manufacturing establishments at about the time they reached the peak of their powers, and in three years time after incorporation the basket factory was moved to Kansas City, Kansas, and an allied plant was set up at St. Louis. At the new locations, in view of the positions both of the source of raw material and the market for the finished product, the business was much more advantageously situated in the matter of freight rates than it had been at Lawrence. G.W. GRIFFITH, prominent Lawrence business man and Douglas County Commissioner, was active in both the Kansas Basket Manufacturing Company and the St. Louis Basket Manufacturing Company after the change. General ROBERTS and his associates set up a basket factory at Poplar Bluff, Missouri, although General ROBERTS continued to reside in Lawrence. In 1893 the Poplar Bluff factory was destroyed by fire; the loss was estimated at \$40,000, only one-fourth of which was covered by insurance.

p.165: In 1899, after the city had given definite assurance that Massachusetts Street, at least, would be paved, the Lawrence Vitriified Brick and Tile Company was organized by the following group: A. MONROE, president; A. MARKS, vice-president; N.O. STEVENS, Eben BALDWIN, M. ROBINSON, John McFARLANE, Ben McFARLANE, L.C. WILSON, and J.N. ROBERTS. The new company used part of its \$32,000 paid-in capital to buy the McFARLANE brick yard entire, together with the clay and shale

beds on the river bank, which an expert had estimated were large enough to supply the new brick plant for two hundred years. Construction of the plant got under way in the summer of 1899.

EARLY KANSAS HOME SOLD - LAWRENCE CIVIL WAR VETERAN WILL MOVE TO CALIFORNIA

LAWRENCE KS, MARCH 10 - SPECIAL - The home of Gen. J.N. ROBERTS, one of the oldest mansions in Kansas, was sold today to J.J. SIMMONS, manager of the Lawrence Brick Co. The purchase price was announced at \$20,000.00. General ROBERTS announced that he and his wife intend to move to California April 1. The ROBERTS home was built during the panic of 1893.

General ROBERTS' career, both before and after he came to Kansas, is an interesting one. He served throughout the Civil War in the cavalry regiment under Phil SHERIDAN. He enlisted in 1861 under General McCLELLAN, took part in the Battle of Rich Mountain and Beverly Ford. After being severely wounded in an engagement near Alpperville, Virginia he was discharged because of physical disability.

After coming to Kansas he represented Douglas County in the State Legislature in 1885-1886. He was Adjutant General of Kansas for four years from 1889. He was the first Post Commander of Washington Post No. 12 G.A.R. in Lawrence.



NOTES FROM THE LAWRENCE JOURNAL

November 30, 1888: The building near the Delaware Mills, at one time the private residence of O. DARLING, was sold by the railroad company not long past for \$60. The building was erected 26 years before and was repaired several times since. "The removal of these old buildings improves that part of town."

December 15, 1888: A.G. EIDEMILLER was making improvements to "Lawrence's Ice Plant." The Lawrence Journal told of his "extensive ice chambers on the north side" and of a building soon to be found on the south side of the Kansas River. The new structure would be able to store from 8,000 to 10,000 tons of ice. The Journal told of his railroad shipments, noting that "Mr. EIDEMILLER has side tracks extending some distance up the river on both sides, along which are built a number of slides for the purpose of loading ice onto cars direct from the river... The capacity of these slides is between 200 and 300 cars per day." Between 200 and 300 workers were employed by him during the ice harvesting season.

December 26, 1888: An ice storm decorated the mid-street sign of WOODWARD's Round Corner at Henry and Massachusetts Streets and made it a beautiful sight to behold.

January 16, 1889: L.O. McINTIRE added a new cash system to his dry goods store at 919 Massachusetts, Lawrence. The "Lamson rapid spring cash system" operated by means of "slender steel wires radiated from the cashier's desk to the sales stations, all coming in overhead."

February 1889: The Lawrence Journal noted that the firm of W.W. FLUKE and Son at 739 Massachusetts, Lawrence, had "sold during the last six weeks, 13 pianos and 7 organs. Their sheet music trade is also better than ever."

TWIN MOUND, MARION TOWNSHIP

The following excerpts were taken from "Soil of Our Souls," by Martha Parker and Betty Laird (Parker-Laird Enterprises, Overbrook, KS, 1980), pages 120-133. The book is available for purchase or research at the Elizabeth M. Watkins Community Museum, and contains more detail about some of the names mentioned here.

Twin Mound owes its origin to an outspoken dreamer named Henry HIATT. Born in 1816, the son of Silas HIATT, Henry grew up in Dublin, Indiana. However, he married a New York girl, Frances Elizabeth SMITH, whom he met while on a trip with her brother, Aaron Burr SMITH. Aaron was married to Elda Ann HIATT, Henry's sister.

In April, 1856, Henry, Frances, and their five children, along with Frances's widowed mother, moved to Kansas Territory, settling first at Bloomington in Douglas County. The family and all their possessions, except for the livestock, traveled by boat from Cincinnati, Ohio to Kansas City. The livestock was brought by a party coming overland with whom HIATT had made special arrangements. Following a practice common at the time, HIATTs brought their house with them. Originally constructed in Cincinnati, the building was disassembled in sections for quick reassembly in Kansas.

Shortly after his arrival in Bloomington, HIATT and two other men opened a steam saw mill, the first in the area. Within a year, however, HIATT had decided to move on. Selling his interest in the mill to his partners, he transported his family some seven miles southwest to a place which he named Twin Mounds. (Within a few years the "s" was dropped, leaving the name Twin Mound.)

Hauling the lumber for his house from the Bloomington mill (the mill had burned shortly after he sold his interest, and all that he received for his share was enough lumber for the project), HIATT began construction. The house was two stories high, unusually large for a pioneer home. Most of the interior was finished with walnut. The doors on a large cupboard over the fireplace were made of a single walnut slab. Even before the house was completed, HIATT began to plant trees.

For several years, HIATT used his home as a station in the underground railroad to help slaves escape. The slaves were brought to him by Capt. W.B. KENNEDY, who lived five miles south of Lawrence. HIATT carried them in a covered wagon to Col. RICHIE's home in Highland Park, the next station on their slow and dangerous journey to Canada and freedom. Occasionally, when the chance of being searched by proslavery parties seemed likely, HIATT took them to the home of Edwin SMITH, a mile or so west, until it seemed safe to take them on to Topeka.

Coming with the HIATT family to Kansas, was Mrs. HIATT's mother, Abigail Jessup SMITH, a widow, seventy-seven years old. She also preempted 160 acres of land, which included part of the south mound, and lived there in a small cabin until her death in 1864.

In 1858 Henry HIATT constructed a stone grist mill at a site about a quarter of a mile northeast of his house. Equipping the mill with stones cut from Vermont granite, HIATT ground his neighbors's grain into feed and meal. It was believed to be the second mill in the state, the first having been built at Lawrence. The mill structure was made large enough to accommodate a post office and a general store as well. There HIATT sold groceries, drygoods, and hardware and bought produce from local farmers, including butter and hides, which he then hauled to Lawrence for marketing. HIATT traveled by ox team all the way to Leavenworth to purchase his flour, crossing the river at Lawrence on the ferry.

On June 3, 1859, Judge Josiah MILLER, probate judge at Lawrence, preempted a 160 acre tract "in trust for the several use and benefit of the occupants of Twin Mound Town Site," and on May 9, 1863, assigned that land to Henry HIATT as "Trustee appointed by the persons who laid out the town site of Twin Mound." Almost immediately, HIATT began to sell blocks to prospective citizens. On June 19th, for example, he sold five blocks to William D. BLACKFORD for a total of \$50.00. Although the town must have been platted by 1863, the official plat was recorded in July of 1870.

On November 1, 1865, a school board consisting of John SULLIVAN, Henry HIATT, and Clinton SEAMIG purchased for \$25.00 a tract of ground containing two acres in Block 13 in Twin Mound. There a one-room stone schoolhouse was built. The stone schoolhouse was probably the second school in the community, however, as Ethyl Talley PETEFISH recalls that her father attended school during territorial days in a log cabin located north of the present building. The stone structure, more durable than the log one, was to remain in operation for just over one hundred years, when the local schools were consolidated. On Sunday, May 29, 1966, a basket dinner and program marked the closing of the last one-room schoolhouse left in Douglas County. Over 130 people, including eight former teachers, attended the ceremony. The oldest living former student was Fred DEZIUS, eighty-nine years old, who had attended the school eighty years before.

- the Twin Mound Grange No. 123 of Marion Township, which was organized by T.E. TABER on May 2, 1873. I.H. SMITH was the first Master and P.R. FORTNEY, the first secretary. A dispensation was given on May 14, and the Charter issued on October 17, 1873.

The first meeting of the Grange Library Association was held in September 1877 at the home of Brother WHITE with Brother THURBER presiding. A constitution was written, and bylaws governing the organization were adopted. Sixteen members bought the original forty-five shares in the association: Henry HIATT, W.R. OWENS, A.E. WHITE, Whitford THURBER, F. VanHORN, E. MOSS, A. THURBER, H.T. WHITE, A. OWENS, D.D. SIZER, and H. TUSSEY. The minutes from 1877 through 1893 reveal that the meetings were held mostly in homes, at the post office, at the HIATT store, and in the HIATT home. One meeting, that of January 4, 1879, was held at the schoolhouse.

In 1891 a Missourian by the name of CARPENTER became postmaster and opened a store about 100 yards east of the old mill site. Two years later, he sold his business to J.W. BANKER, also from Missouri, who constructed a more suitable building.

In 1902 the Silas HINDMAN family, who owned a grocery store in Augusta, Kansas, traded their business for a 320 acre farm at Twin Mound. They also constructed a new frame grocery store across the road from the mill site. However, Silas HINDMAN was to operate the store and act as postmaster for only one year, for in 1903 he died. Five years later, the family sold the farm and moved to Lawrence. One of the children, Albert, who was only six when the family first moved to Twin Mound, was a bright, ambitious lad with a journalistic bent. Some years later, after acquiring a job with the "Kansas City Star," HINDMAN elevated Twin Mound to regional fame by reminiscing on the editorial page about his youth and his home town.

The first rural free postal delivery to Twin Mound was established in 1903 with the home post office at Richland, Kansas. The first carrier was Pat ALLBAUGH, and his son Charles was his assistant.

Not until nine years after HIATT's death (1909) was the first church, Methodist, completed. First initiated in 1907 with a fund drive, the one-room frame structure was made possible by donated labor and a memorial contribution from a Mrs. MONTGOMERY, in memory of her husband. Since the church did not have a resident minister, it was served by ministers from Richland, Overbrook, Clinton, and other nearby towns. The trustees were M.B. SINCLAIR, E.A. GAINES, O.W. DORAN, C.P. HARDING, and B. FOGERTY. The church was active until 1929, after which time it was used as a church only occasionally, sometimes by other denominations.

Memories of ALBERT H. HINDMAN

The following was taken from a column that Albert HINDMAN wrote for the Kansas City Star newspaper. It is undated. Submitted by Martha Parker.

When the Rural Folk "Held Forth"

From the age of 6 until 12, I lived on a farm 20 miles west and slightly south of Lawrence, in a little community called Twin Mounds.

November, in Twin Mounds, was memorable, for in that month the semimonthly Literary society began its sessions for the winter season in the little rock schoolhouse.

Everyone who was able to walk, ride a horse or drive a buggy congregated at 7:30 o'clock and proceeded to "hold forth" in a grand manner. There were many recitations from Longfellow, Bryant, James Whitcomb Riley, Edgar Allan Poe, Tennyson, and many others of the grand old poets of yesteryear.

One recitation I remember so clearly that it seems only yesterday that I heard it. It was given, more than once by request, by a tall young man of German ancestry, named Paul GROSSKOPF. He had a remarkable, stentorian voice, and he recited Tennyson's "Charge of the Light Brigade," until the rafters rung!

And then there was the singing. There was a quartet composed of Scott, Elmer and Charlie HARDING and one other man whose name I have forgotten, but how they could sing. Their favorite number and the one that stamped itself indelibly on my memory, went like this:

 Come where the lilies, the sweet fragrant lilies,
 Oh come where the lilies bloom so fair.

And these two lines were repeated. After this, the bass member would proclaim, in very deep tones:

 Come away - come A-Way - come A-Way-Y-Y-Y
 Come where the lilies bloom so fair.

One night a young man who was popular in the community, Harry SUTTON, was called upon to give a recitation. He hung back for a long time, but after repeated coaxing and cries of, "Oh, come on, Harry!" he mounted the platform, eyed the audience with a wide grin, and declaimed the following:

Our cow had a calf -
That's half.
I saw a rat run up the wall -
I saw it's tail. That's all.

This brought down the house, with loud shrieks of laughter from the ladies, and whistles and stamping of feet from the men and boys.

But real talent was displayed at times. One young lady of 16 or 17 was very lovely, and had a beautiful voice. It was, as I remember, a clear, lyric soprano, and when she sang the beautiful songs and hymns of the day, shivers of delight would chase up and down my spine. Her name was Candace COLE, and I hope that she is still alive somewhere and still singing.

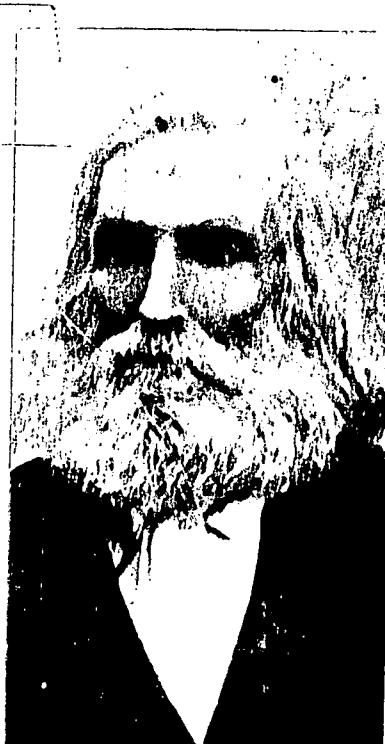

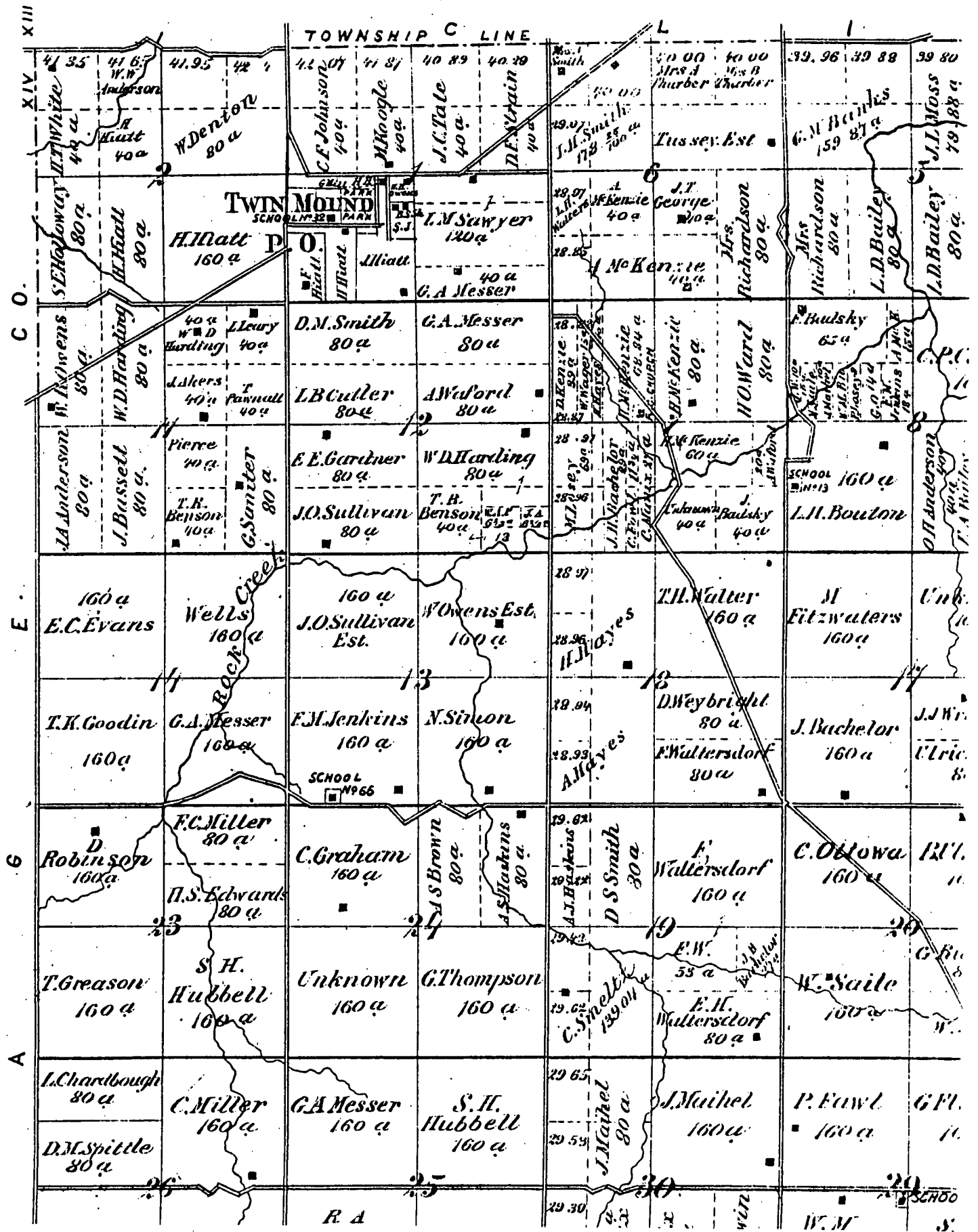

WILLIAM DENTON, Geologist and Naturalist

Taken from the "Philatelic West and Collector's World," Superior, Nebraska, dated sometime in 1910, article by George J. REMSBURG. Kansas State Historical Society file 48301. Submitted by Martha Parker.

Only a few people outside of some of the early settlers of Douglas County, Kansas, are cognizant of the fact that one of the most noted American geologists and naturalists, William DENTON, once lived in Kansas. The writer visited Douglas County some time ago and learned from the late Henry HIATT, one of the pioneers of that section, some interesting facts relative to the early career of the distinguished scientist. I visited the spot where Mr. DENTON's cabin stood and picked up a number of relics from the debris of his pioneer home.

About fifteen miles southwest of Lawrence and nearly the same distance southeast of Topeka, on the beautiful prairie south of the Wakarusa River, stand two natural elevations, from which, on account of their striking similarity, the locality derived its name of Twin Mounds. Some of the old settlers believed that these mounds were built by a mound-building race, but Mr. DENTON demonstrated that they were of natural origin. A townsite was laid out here at an early day, but a small village of several houses is all that ever materialized. The landscape here is a magnificent one. It seems that nature must have designed the beautiful twin mounds expressly as observatories for the use of man in gazing upon the splendid expanse of country that stretches away from them on every side. A short distance to the south the famous old Santa Fe Trail winds its serpentine form across the prairie; off to the northwest may be seen the state capitol dome in Topeka, and the northeast may be caught a glimpse of the state university of Lawrence. Looking across the Wakarusa to the north is seen in the distant haze, the majestic hills that skirt the valley of the Kaw. To the east is Rock Creek, where many interesting fossils, especially of leaf-impression, are found. The panorama that here presents itself is one of those picturesque blendings of prairie and valley, of hill and woodland, of varied scenery, such as characterizes this section of Kansas, and which engaged in glowing tribute the pen of John C. FREMONT, the "Pathfinder," as he passed this way in 1842.

Here on one of these Twin Mounds stood the little cabin home of Wm. DENTON, and here he pursued his studies and researches from 1858 to 1880. Here in this primitive home, almost isolated, and amid the "beneficent fruition of nature," lived this lover of nature, and here he imbibed such of the inspiration that molded his "Soul of Things," and his "Past, Present and Future." Mr. DENTON, according to Henry HIATT, often lectured at the different pioneer settlements in Douglas County.

It is a historical fact that the city of Lawrence was founded largely by Unitarians. During the early days Mr. DENTON made arrangements to deliver a lecture in the Unitarian Church at Lawrence. When the time arrived they refused to allow the lecture in the church on the pretext that DENTON was a spiritualist, there being a decided aversion to spiritism at that time. Not to be foiled, however, by this spirit of prejudice, DENTON decided to have a meeting on the street. Mr. HIATT was there and proposed that a boy be sent over the town ringing a bell to get a crowd together. A boy could not be secured so Mr. HIATT took the bell himself and soon had an immense crowd to listen to the redoubtable thinker. "DENTON was much enthused," said HIATT, "and made a speech that almost captivated the vast throng of people." DENTON was also an ardent temperance advocate and promulgated it at every opportunity. Among the highly prized relics of DENTON's which the writer secured at Twin Mounds is a book he owned in 1858, and which was generously donated by Mr. O.O. HIATT, who lived within a stone's throw of DENTON's old home.

William DENTON's fame rests chiefly on his great geolocial researches. Among his works are the following: "Our Planet," "The Soul of Things," "Past, Present, and Future," "The Origin of Man," etc. Of the many discussions in which he engaged the most notable was with President James A. GARFIELD, on the origin of man. A few months later Charles DARWIN produced his great work on the "Origin of the Species," corroborating by carefully recorded observations the evidence presented by Mr. DENTON in that debate.

DENTON's lecture tours carried him to all parts of North America. He then went to Australia, New Zealand and Tasmania, and died in New Guinea in 1883, while engaged in scientific research. He was 60 years of age. His companions wrapped him in his blanket and buried him on a mountain near where he died. His widow is, or was at last account, living at Wellesley, Mass. The accompanying picture shows Mr. DENTON as he appeared when he resided in Kansas.

HENRY HIATT, A Man Ahead of His Time

The following excerpts were taken from the book written by Henry HIATT, "My Belief and Reasons Therefor," pages 18-19 (Jefferson Gazett Co., Publishers, Lawrence, KS, dated sometime after 1893). A copy is filed at the Watkins Museum.

I was born December 30, 1815, in Warren County, Ohio. At the age of five my parents moved to Wayne County, Indiana, where I lived until April, 1856, when I moved to Kansas at the age of 27. Was married to Fanny E., daughter of Isaiah and Abigail SMITH, of Goshen, Orange County, New York. My wife died April 19, 1859, at Twin Mound, having given birth to one boy and five girls, three of whom are living. Three years later was married to my present wife, Abby A. MEAD, who gave birth to four boys and two girls, of whom five are living.

When about the age of 21 I took an active interest in the Washington Temperance Society just organized in Baltimore by six reformed drunkards who, with the aid of a few early converts, were having great success in lecturing through the States, obtaining simple pledges to abstain from the use of all intoxicants as a beverage. But with individual exceptions the united church, true to their history and early training, turned their engines and batteries against the movement, loaded with passages from the Bible. In the first years they would neither open the doors of their churches nor in any way countenance tetotal abstinence. This was my first lesson against the church.

About the same time or a little later the anti-slavery question followed that of temperance as another and still greater disturbing element in the states north and south, and having inherited a deep sympathy for those in bonds as being bound with them I could do no other than give a portion of my life work and means to assist the slaves of the south in obtaining their freedom. The remembrance of no part of said work gives me more pleasure than that of making two trips to Topeka in a close covered spring wagon in which was secreted each trip two colored men - slaves, on their way to Canada. Starting at sunset, leaving them at Col. RICHIE's at midnight, and returning home by sunrise in the morning, RICHIE hauling them to the next station, and so on.

Abigail (JESSUP) SMITH was born 14 Dec 1780 Sag Harbor, Long Island, NY, and died 18 Dec 1864, Twin Mound, KS.

Henry HIATT was born in Warren Co., Ohio, and moved to Wayne Co., Indiana when he was five years old. He went with his brother-in-law, Aaron Burr SMITH, to Orange Co., NY, to visit Aaron's parents, and married Frances (Fanny) SMITH, sister of Aaron.

They moved to Bloomington, Douglas Co., Kansas in April 1856, when he and two partners operated a steam saw mill. He sold his interest in the mill in 1857, and moved to Twin Mound, Kansas Territory. (The July 1857 map shows this as not being settled.) Here he built a stone grist mill, wind powered. He was also a farmer.

Henry built a stone windmill for grinding grain. The building also housed a general store and the first post office in the community. Their home was on the stage line between Lawrence and Carbondale, and was known as the Twin Mound House, where travelers ate their noon meal, and horses were fed and watered.

He was raised a Quaker and attended meeting regularly, but was read out of the church for questioning and arguing about anything he did not understand (or agree with), but adhered closely to Quaker principals. He never swore, but his pet expressions were "Dod Rotted," "Dag Nabed," "Con Sarned," "Dad blamed," "Ding blasted," and if very mad he would come up with "Jeeves river."

Henry only attended 3 months regular school, but was educated by his parents. In reading his articles, several have remarked that he was ahead of his times. A short time before he died, he selected a large, sturdy log, and carved his own coffin from it. When he tested it, he found it snug around the shoulders, so widened it at that point. His mill stones, inscribed simply "Henry HIATT, A Pioneer," mark his grave in the Twin Mound Cemetery, which he helped organize. Also buried there are his first, second wife, Frances, Abigail, and his sons, Homer, Oral, Clyde (wife Anna) and Theron (Mary, Alice), also a number of other relatives. He was also registered as a lawyer.

Abigail Ann MEAD was the niece of Henry's first wife, Fanny SMITH.

Oaxana Clary HIATT attended Hesper Academy (Quaker), southeast of Lawrence. Querentha (Quintie) took painting at K.U. (at least). Kumwegif (Wegie) was a school teacher, and at least two of her pupils named their daughters "Wegie." Homer was a store-keeper. Theron and Effie attended Lawrence Business College. Leoti attended Kansas State, Manhattan, then took nursing at the Cook Co. Hospital in Chicago.

Mourn Death of O.O. HIATT, Jan 10

This obituary was taken from an unknown newspaper. Submitted by Martha Parker.

Mr. HIATT was well-known to local residents, having done much study.

Orel O. HIATT was born at Twin Mound, Kansas, November 3, 1865. He attended the home school for 10 or 12 years as was the custom at that time. By reading a great deal he gave himself a higher education. He took up the study of shorthand which was very unusual at that time, also astronomy and geology. From the banks of Rock Creek he dug out many rare and valuable geological specimens which he

presented to the State University. Later he became interested in theosophy and made a trip to India in 1902 to better acquaint himself with the teaching and belief of that society.

He was very much interested in the early history of Kansas and had many relics of the Indians and pioneers.

With the exception of 5 years he lived at Dover, Kansas and the 2 years he spent in travel, he lived on the old homestead that his father preempted in 1857. Two years ago the old home burned and since then he has lived with his brother, Clyde. He had been in poor health for a number of years and after a short severe illness passed away, January 10, 1941.

Reminiscenes of HENRY HIATT of Twin Mound

From the Kansas State Historical Society. Submitted by Martha Parker. The notation about claims seems to indicate they were taken from the depositions supporting claims made by Kansas citizens against the United States, and recorded in the House Reports of 1861. These page numbers, however, do not refer to the House Reports for the 2nd Session of the 36th Congress in 1861. (See claims of George Ward and Toussaint LaHay which follow.)

Letter dated 2 Jun 1893, Twin Mound, Kan., to F.G. ADAMS, Sec. Hist. Society, Topeka, Kan.

Dear Sir,

Your communication of Jan 12 was duly received, but have delayed, having doubts of my ability to recollect circumstances and dates transpiring more than one third of Century since, that could at all interest the reader of today. Tis true I witnessed and was cognizant of many exciting and some tragical deeds during my first two or three years residence in Kansas, some of which you doubtless have on record.

I arrived in Kansas on the 26th day of April 1856 in company with P.R. BERKAU and Shubal SWAIN. We settled ten miles southwest of Lawrence at a place since called Bloomington, lying between the historic stream Wakarusa on the North and Rock Creek on the South. We selected that locality on account of the abundance of large and valuable timber on those streams for sawing; and we in partnership engaged in constructing one of the largest saw mills ever built in the state under the firm of Berkau, Hiatt and Swain. Whilst engaged in construction of said mill, we were annoyed more or less by armed Border Ruffians in the interest of, and working for, the Institution of Slavery, in small squads and Companies of from fifty to five hundred or more. My first annoyance was running the gauntlet in hauling overland from Kansas City my household goods, Cottage House and our Sawmill machinery. As our direct road was infested by a gang of some fifty or sixty armed ruffians, encamped six miles west of Kansas City, and for two weeks were the terror of most who traveled that way, especially those going West. Some were plundered, robbed and had their horses taken, their wagon and harness probably left by the road side. My friends advised me not to go and risk my life and team. The latter I would surely lose. But I told them I never carried arms, and would give them no cause to missuse me, besides which we were needing our machinery. So I started with two teams, one ox and one horse team, my twelve year old son driving the ox team. When arriving at the Indian Bluejackets Hotel about halfway to Kansas City found a man who had lost a pair of good horses. He was waiting the action of the Governor to whom he had written for assistance to reclaim his horses. We arrived at the City next day without disturbance from the Rufians. When our waggons were loaded the Kansas City Merchants warned me of the danger of passing by their camp, as those leaving the City with supplies were

objects of their lawlessness. But we went out within two miles of their Camp where we stopped an hour to rest and graze our teams, where there was a well at a Baptist Church. While there the Camp (having been routed by the Governour) came marching up and halted to drink at the well, where they lounged around for a half hour before starting for Missouri. I mingled with them freely, endeavoring to hire a couple of them to help in the construction of our mill. I found them pleasant and sociable fellows, who under more favourable circumstances would make good citizens. My load consisted of a Sheetiron Smoke Stack 45 ft. in length and 2 ft. in diameter, flattended at one end with a sleight angle to stand on the furnace giving it the appearance of a huge musket or cannon.

On my way home I met five ruffians each armed with a Carbon, two revolvers and a large buoy knife. They were returning home from a marauding trip in the Territory. Had I been at all frightened, would have received rough treatment. As soon as the leader was near enough to speak he began Swearing as none but a ruffian could, saying I had the d-mdest biggest cannon he ever saw. Yes Siree, I replied, just give me enough amunition to load it and I can do up the whole business at once. After a big hah hah, he said by g-d that would kill every d-md abolitionist in the State at one shott. You can go on you are all right on the goose, and feeling sure I was thoroughly proslavery allowed me to pass unmolested.

Soon after this a Company of some fifty border ruffians took possession of a house partially fortified in front by a stone fence (some three miles distant from my residence) on the high prairie on Washington which was lined with hundreds of acres of brush and young timber affording large facilities for hiding or escape. They remained in possession of said house a month or more in July and August 1856 doing little or no mischief that I now recollect, untill they were visited by a Major ___ from Massachusetts who was stopping in Lawrence. Have lost his name, though he was frequently a guest at my house, and being a free Mason he believed he could visit their Camp and be permitted to leave without injury, and would doubtless have succeeded if all at the Camp had been freemasons, but he was followed by two or three who murdered him and partially buried him within a mile of the Camp, where he was found three days later and brought past my house where I saw but could not recognize him.

The neighbours were immediately aroused, and some four hundred armed men were soon enrount for the Camp led by Gen. LANE, determined to punish the muderous invaders of the Territory. But the guards were on the look out and saw LANE's army approaching and vacated the house with the greatest possible celerity and despatch leaving behind them provisions, muskets, trunks, robes and blankets in the house, and scattered through the thick brush, under cover of which they were permitted to escape.

Before said Camp was routed, old John BROWN of Harpers Ferry notoriety stayed at my house overnight. From certain rumours just received, led our milling Company to anticipate an attack that night from said camp, but our fears were allayed by the presence and advice of old Mr. BROWN, who said he would show us how to make a substantial fortification in twenty minutes, by rolling into proper place a few of the large sawlogs in our Mill yard, behind which three or four men armed with loaded shotguns or muskets could defend the place against any probable attack.

About this time a few of my Free State neighbours went across the Wakarusa in the night some ten miles and drove home and butchered a three year old steer out of a herd belonging to a proslavery man. Soon after which another party of freestate neighbours went after night into the house of an elderly woman being alone (her husband having been a member of the first Territorial Legislature elected by Missourians, and who under the press of excitement had left his wife and home to seek protection elsewhere) ordered her out of the house. On receiving her positive refusal, they threw her beds and household furniture in a pile on the

floor and set it on fire, first selecting for themselves such articles of bedding &c &c as they could carry away. The lady of the house, powerless, witnessed the burning of all her effects, walked slowly miles away to the house of some friend for shelter and protection. The burning was followed up by plundering and carrying off all the chickens and butchering a pig or two in the pen and the only cow in the lot also dividing into a share a piece his green corn in the field. The latter, however, was sullenly yielded to the owner on his return in time to gather it in the fall.

I was indignant at such criminal actions and the more so because the perpetrators set up for themselves a higher standard, in favour of a free State one step at least, in advance of the South. Other property was stolen, other houses burned by free State persons, all of which tended more or less to thwart the effects of those honestly labouring for freedom, tempered with justice, and correspondingly strengthened the hands of those labouring to extend the Institution of Slavery.

In the latter part of August 1856 the roads through which Lawrence obtained her supplies from the Rivver were blocked by Border Ruffians so it became necessary for me to go to Lecompton for flour. Arriving there at noon on Saturday I found the Town full of Border Ruffians. Someone spotted me and I was made a prisoner in half an hour, thrust in to a low tent with half a dozen others previously arrested. On the first night of our confinement our situation was the most critical. About 11 p.m. we were surrounded by 15 or 20 Border Ruffians, about as rough a set of freebooters as could be found, who claimed that the Tent under which we were confined belonged to them and they were going to have it, their object doubtless was to tear the Tent from over us and drag the prisoners into the brush and rob and murder us. Our guard who was a small Kentucky Irishman was armed with a double barrel shotgun revolver and buoy knife and was equal to the occasion, his fearless pluck and courage mingled with oaths was rarely if ever equaled.

After remaining two nights in Lecompton the whole Army some five hundred men, marched south in the direction of my home some six miles away being full half way, which alarmed my wife and mill pardners causing them to pack in Trunks and boxes the more valuable household goods and bury them in the cornfield. Whilst encamped at the latter place Gen. STRINGFELLOW and Col. ROBBERTS one of his officers had a quarrel which came nigh terminating in a dual, on account of their Scouts having burned six of the best farm houses along the road. STRINGFELLOW endorsed, ROBBERTS condemned the burning, stating that he came with his company of sixty armed men for the express purpose of putting a stop to burning houses by Free State people, and if their party were permitted to do the same thing, he would take his men and go home, which he did without delay reducing the numbers in Camp and leaving them badly discouraged. After three Camping in the Country, the balance of the Army in charge of their prisoners returned to Lecompton on Friday morning by a different rout.

Soon after arrival Gen. LANE with some four hundred armed men were seen approaching the Town over the prairie. Many of the Border Ruffians were badly scared, but most of them were ready for the fight under protection of the Basement of the new Capital and such other hiding places as they could find. Of the seven prisoners, two including myself were immediately discharged on condition we should join neither side in the approaching battle. The manner in which the National Guards intercepted Gen. LANE preventing a fight is doubtless on the record.

Soon as I learned there would be no fight, I returned to see Capt. HAMPTON who had charge of the prisoners and who had so unceremoniously released me an hour previous to obtain his assistance in reclaiming my team still in possession and claimed by the man who had me arrested. On arrival I found some 300 Ruffians who were the most anxious to kill somebody formed in a hollow square with a man

counting them and Col. TITUS on horse back in the ring harrangning them preliminary to pursuit of Gen. LANE. Cap. HAMPTON saw and came to me whispering in my ear to get back to my room immediately as I would not be safe there a minute, but as those seeking Abolition blood were all in the ring. I was not recognized and permitted to escape. On leaving I met Gen. RICHARDSON commander who likewise charged me to get back to a place of safety. So I was placed in custody for the night with other prisoners taken near Leavenworth and who had not been released.

In the morning whilst marching from our place of confinement some 100 yards to our breakfast, two others and myself, a Border Ruffian was only prevented from shooting one of us by the bursting of a gun cap. Acting Gov. WOOSON at once ordered him across the rivver. Through the efforts of Cap. HAMPTON I regained my team with a shower of abuse from the man claiming it, to offset the loss of Ponies he said the Abolitionist had stolen from him. I arrived at home with my flour on Saturday evening having been retained a prisoner one week.

P.S. I find in looking over what I have written that it is mostly personal matter, having little or no interest to the general reader. If there any items worthy of notice all right otherwise throw it aside. I have been inexcusably behind in promptly writing. Yours Truly, s. Henry HIATT

Claims, 1861, p.1536.

Toussiant LaHAY settled in Douglas County before I came to Kansas, and built a nicely furnished pine house of three or four rooms, plastered, painted, and on a raised foundation. His claim was half a mile east of what is now known as Sigel Bridge, a little post office at the crossing of the Wakarusa, eight miles from Lawrence.

Gabriel MARKLE, who married a daughter of LaHAY, still lives on this place. The house was one of the nicest ones in the country at that time, and was perhaps put up in 1855. Mr. LaHAY had a wife, two sons, and two or more daughters. His boys were pro-slavery and rough and always ready to fight. I think he owned one or two slaves. His boys were both large enough to hold claims, and I think there must have been two or three quarter sections of land in the family, good bottom land. LaHAY was a man of wealth and influence among his people. Sometime in 1856 a party of free-state men, supposed to have been residents of the vicinity, but whose identity I never learned, robbed his house of furniture, clothing, etc., and burned it to the ground. LaHAY was intimidated by this outrage, but immediately put up a log-pole hut with dirt floor where he lived for some time and until he built a better frame house than the first. I think he left our (not legible) before the war, going South. I think his daughter married Mr. MARKLE about the time he left.

I felt indignant when I heard of the robbing and burning of LaHAY's house, although I was a free-state man and had come to Kansas with the intention of doing my part in the struggle. I remember of calling on LaHAY early in our acquaintance and expressing my desire that we should be neighborly. I told him that it was only the circumstances of our bringing up that made me an abolitionist and him pro-slavery; had he been residing north and I south, our views would have accorded with our environments. He seemed greatly pleased with my overtures of friendship, and we always got on well together. My wife and I attended the marriage of one of his daughters during the time the family lived in the log house. The young man whom she married worked in my saw mill.

Claims, 1861, p.1735-1737.

I had another neighbor by the name of George W. WARD, who had been a member of the first border ruffian legislature. He had a comfortable double log house. For reasons of personal safety, he left home in the fall of 1856, leaving his wife, a woman of perhaps sixty years, in charge of the premises. On the night of

September 7th, some free-state men in our neighborhood, Alfred CURTIS, A.E. LOVE, and one other man I did not know, went to WARD's house, and not finding him at home proceeded to carry away bedding and clothing. They then piled the furniture together and set fire to it. They had ordered his wife to leave, but she would not go until the fire drove her out. They took some cattle, hogs, and chickens. The cattle they killed, and offered it for sale in the neighborhood. Some time after the fire Mr. WARD returned and rebuilt the house, remaining a year or two until he could sell it, going south before the war.

The men who committed these deperadations were our free-state neighbors. I told them that it was our duty to behave ourselves. If we acted as badly as the Missourians, plundering and murdering, our friends in the east would have no sympathy for us, and would leave us to our fate.

Claim of GEORGE W. WARD Before the 36th Congress of the United States

The following petition is recorded in Volume 2 of "Kansas Claims, House Reports, 36th Congress, 2nd Session," No. 476, pages 1733-1737 at the Spencer Research Library, call No. 1107. Researched by the editor. In the interest of space and genealogical value, I have recorded here only excerpts from the petition.

In the matter of the petition of George W. WARD.

Territory of Kansas, County of Douglas, ss:

George W. WARD, the above named petitioner, being duly sworn, saith: I presented a statement of my actual losses during the difficulties of 1855-56 to H.J. STRICKLER, late commissioner to audit claims under the act of 1857. The witnesses upon whom devolved the proof of my claim were J.M. TUTON, Toussaint LaHAY, and Sidney M. WARD; and deponent further saith that the statement so presented to said commissioner was correct and true according to the best of knowledge and belief of this deponent, and that deponent is unable to obtain the attendance of all of said witnesses before the present board of commissioners, as some of them are absent from the Territory, as far as deponent knows or can ascertain. J.M. TUTON, as deponent is informed, is now living in the southwest of Missouri; his testimony being important in this case, deponent respectfully asks of the honorable board of commissioners, appointed to provide for adjustment and payment of claims, that the testimony, proof, and papers originally taken by the former commissioner, H.J. STRICKLER, be accepted as his petition and testimony under the present law. I have never recovered any of the property nor received any compensation from any source for the property taken as alleged and set forth in the case so presented to the former commissioner, and upon which his award was made in my favor for thirteen hundred and sixty-five dollars. This deponent settled in Kansas during the fall of 1854. His claim is situated upon the Wakarusa, about ten miles from Lawrence. Geo. W. WARD. Subscribed and sworn to before me on this 1st day of August, A.D. 1859. David T. MITCHELL, Notary Public.

Sidney M. WARD, who being duly sworn, says: That she is the wife of Mr. George W. WARD; was at home on the 7th of September 1856. On the evening of that day a body of armed men surrounded the house of the petitioner, (Mr. Ward,) and commenced firing guns; then demanded a surrender of the men; finding there were no men about the premises, they came into the house, took and carried away all the moveable effects of Mr. WARD, such as bedding, clothing, &c; they threatened, at different times, to shoot me if I did not leave the premises; although being in "deshabille," I was not allowed to take a suit of wearing apparel, but, applying the torch to the houses, burnt up all the furniture and effects of the petitioner. I have examined the schedule annexed to the petition of Mr. WARD, and know that

all the articles mentioned were either burned or carried away. Believe that the property, houses, &c., were destroyed by persons engaged in the rebellion, and in direct resistance to the constituted authorities; believe that they destroyed Mr. WARD's property because he differed with them in political sentiments; believe that the estimated value of the property destroyed, stolen and burned, as shown by the schedule, to be fair and correct. Sydney M. WARD. Sworn to and subscribed before me this the 22d of September, 1857. H.J. STRICKLER, Commissioner for Auditing Claims.

John M. TUTON, after being duly sworn, states: That he knows Mr. WARD to be a citizen of the Territory; that he was familiar with Mr. WARD's property and effects, as he had the same under charge during the absence of Mr. WARD; that he carefully examined the annexed list of property submitted by Mr. WARD, and knows that the property enumerated was carried off or destroyed at the time by an armed body of men; that the price annexed to the articles was about the cash price of the same, and believes that the aggregate sum of the loss incurred by Mr. WARD in consequence of the troubles in the Territory could not, under a fair, just, and reasonable valuation, be less than thirteen hundred and sixty-five (1,365) dollars. Sworn to before me this 17th day of September, A.D. 1857. H.J. STRICKLER, Commissioner.

Samuel WALKER, of lawful age, being duly sworn, deposes and says: That he is acquainted with George W. WARD; knows that his houses and effects were burned and destroyed in the fall of 1856; it occurred about the 7th of September. The houses were double log-houses; pretty good houses; the houses and effects were destroyed by an armed body of men. I know everything was burnt up; even the clothing of Mrs. WARD was burnt; that she left the premises in her night clothes. Samuel WALKER. Sworn to and subscribed before me on this 24th day of August, 1859. David T. MITCHELL, Notary Public.

Claim of TOUSSAINT LA HAY Before the 36th Congress of the United States

The following petition is recorded in Volume 2 of "Kansas Claims, House Reports, 36th Congress, 2nd Session," No. 433, pages 1586-1589 at the Spencer Research Library, call No. 1107. Researched by the editor. In the interest of space and genealogical value, I have recorded here only excerpts from the petition.

In the matter of the petition of Toussaint LA HAY.
Territory of Kansas, County of Douglas, ss:

Toussaint LA HAY, the above named petitioner, being duly sworn, deposes and says: That he presented to H.J. STRICKLER, late commissioner to audit claims, appointed under act of 1857, a statement of his actual losses incurred during the difficulties of 1855 and 1856, which statement was correct, according to the best of the knowledge and belief of this deponent. This deponent would further represent that some of the witnesses whose testimony is material and important to this deponent in proof of his claim of losses are now out of the Territory, and that it is impossible for this deponent to secure the attendance of said witnesses before the board of commissioners appointed under an act entitled "An act to provide for the payment and adjustment of claims," approved February 7, 1859. Your deponent would respectfully ask that the proofs, papers, and testimony so presented to the late commissioner, and upon which he made his award in my favor, may be received by the board of commissioners as his petition and testimony under the present law. This deponent would further represent that he has never recovered any of the property lost as alleged and set forth in the statement so presented to

said STRICKLER, nor received compensation from any source for said losses. This deponent has been residing in Kansas since the year 1854, and lives about six miles from Lawrence, upon the Wakarusa River. Toussaint LA HAY. Sworn to and subscribed before me this 29th day of April, A.D. 1859. John SHANNON.

Territory of Kansas, County of Douglas, ss:

I, Toussaint LA HAY, of the Territory and county aforesaid, represent unto the honorable commissioner: That on or about the 15th day of August, A.D. 1856, a body of armed men then and there forcibly too and carried away one horse and two rifles. At another time another body of armed men came and drove away your petitioner's family; took possession of the premises, and took, carried away, or destroyed the property of your petitioner, to wit; Blacksmith's tools, carpenter's tools, harness and saddles, household and kitchen furniture, three head of cattle, and burned the house of your petitioner. All of the above mentioned articles were the property of your said petitioner. Toussaint LA HAY. Sworn to and subscribed this 17th of September, 1857. H.J. STRICKLER, Commissioner.

Mr. J.M. TUTON called, and, under oath, says: That he knows Mr. LA HAY; believes the estimate placed upon the property destroyed to be fair and just; knows that Mr. LA HAY's houses were burned; that the houses were good, comfortable houses; knows that Mr. LA HAY's cattle were taken away, and some were driven to Lawrence; heard on one occassion a gentleman by the name of SWAIN acknowledge that he had killed some of Mr. LA HAY's cattle. Sworn to before me this 17th September, 1857. H. J. STRICKLER, Commissioner.

Francis E. LA HAY, being duly sworn, deposes and says: I am acquainted with Toussaint LA HAY, and live in sight of his house, and lived in sight of his house during the "troubles of 1856;" knows that he incurred losses during the difficulties. This deponent saw a body of armed men come to the premises of Toussaint LA HAY and forcibly take and carry away one horse and two rifles; this was about the middle of August, 1856; prior to this time Toussaint LA HAY had a pair of matched horses stolen; he recovered one of said horses, which was again stolen at the time of the taking of the rifles, as above described. About the 1st of September, 1856, a body of armed men, supposed to be from Lawrence, came to the premises of Toussaint LA HAY, and ordered his family to leave the premises and the Territory, and gave them "passes" to pass out of the Territory uninterrupted. I was present at the time, and a pass was given me. The only reason assigned was that the two elements in the county could not exist together. About the 8th of September, 1856, a body of armed men came and took possession of the premises. I saw these men; they shot at me. They then and there destroyed and carried away nearly everything Mr. LA HAY had; they burned his houses, carried away or burned his kitchen and household furniture, his blacksmith's tools, carpenter's tools, and his harness, saddles, &c. I have reason to suppose that he has never recovered any of the property alleged in the statement presented Hon. H.J. STRICKLER, late commissioner, as lost, nor do I know of his having received any compensation for the same. The cattle were driven away when the house was burned. I heard them driving the cattle off. The pair of horses was worth about \$300; the set of blacksmith's and carpenter's tools were worth \$100; the set of harness and three saddles were worth \$60 or \$65; two rifles were worth \$36; three head of cattle were worth fully \$70. The frame house was plastered; had porches, brick chimney, and was worth \$800 alone. The log house and household furniture were worth several hundred dollars. Mr. LA HAY is a citizen of Kansas, and now resided on Wakarusa, about six miles from Lawrence. Francis E. LA HAY. Sworn to and subscribed before me this 29th day of April, A.D. 1859. NOTES FROM THE LAWRENCE JOURNAL
(Thanks to the Watkins Museum)

November 16, 1888: A house once situated in the middle of a 10-acre plot was up for sale in what is now the Old West Lawrence neighborhood at 747 Illinois. When it was built, it was to be the home of U.S. Senator James H. LANE, but his 1866 suicide had left his family in poverty. The advertisement in the Lawrence Journal stated, "For sale. The beautiful suburban residence 'May Place' northwest of town, just outside of city limits... advantages of country and city combined. Terms very easy. Address Mrs. May LANE, City."

November 26, 1888: Lawrence residents were mourning the loss of Jacob McGEE, an early pioneer. He was "laid away in Oak Hill Cemetery in sight of the spot where he had lived since the first settlement of Kansas."

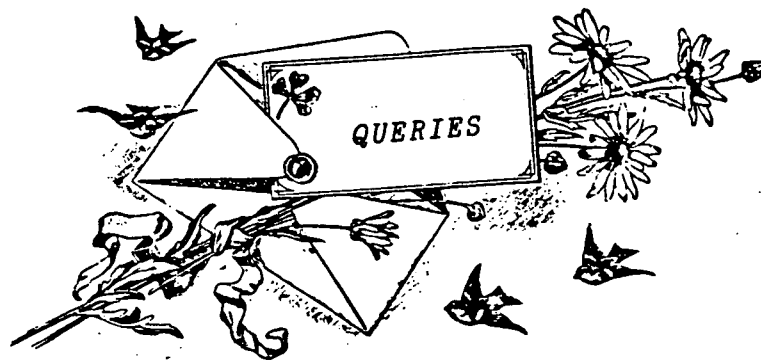

NOTES FROM THE DOUGLAS COUNTY HISTORICAL SOCIETY NEWSLETTER

September 1988: The Elizabeth M. Watkins Museum has acquired the WEAVER collection left by the estate of A.B. WEAVER, a collection of letters, photographs, scrapbooks, school records, awards and business documents. Among the items of possible interest to genealogists are letters dated in the 1850's, even before the first of the BULLENE and READ families came to Lawrence from Wisconsin and before A.D. WEAVER came from Connecticut. A.D. WEAVER married Gertrude BULLENE and their son, Arthur, inherited Lathrop BULLENE's store on Massachusetts Street, now known as Weaver's. A charge ledger from the store dated 1886 documents the people who made purchases and what they bought.

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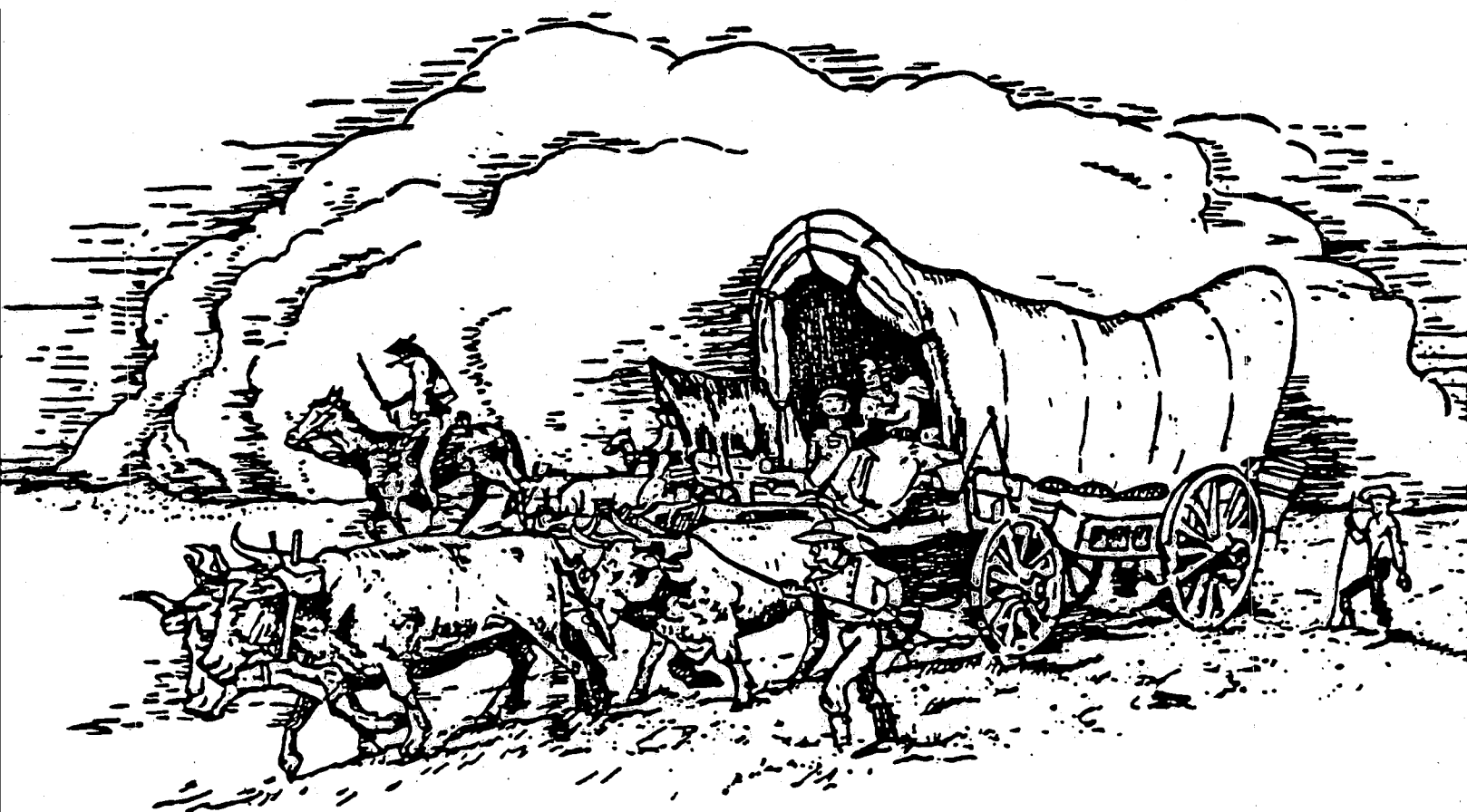
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
