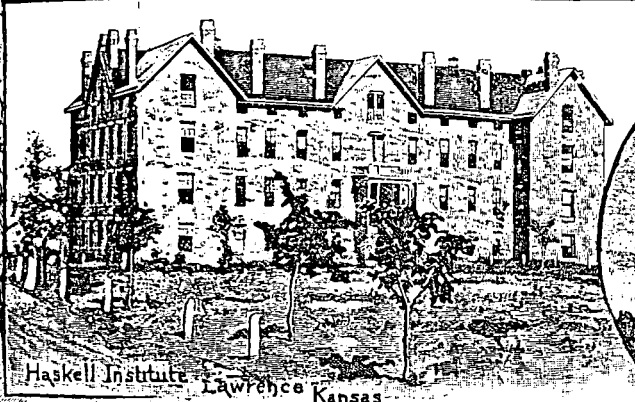


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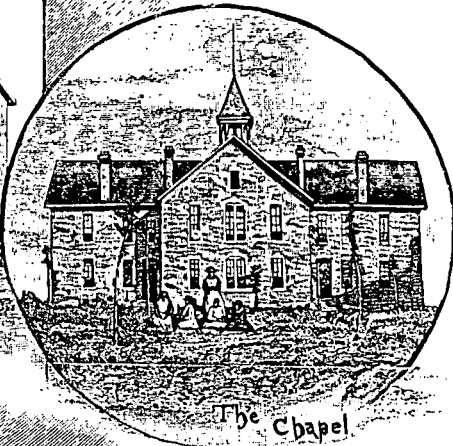



"The Indian training college, situated two miles south of Lawrence, in Douglas County, Kansas, is called the Haskell Institute, after Mr. Dudley Haskell, one of the representatives of that State in Congress. It is under the control of the U. S. Government.

The inmates are male and female members from all tribes living in the Indian territory, our correspondent having seen there representatives of twenty different tribes. . . . Harvey Whiteshield, one of this tribe, and son of the principal chief of the tribe, Chief Whiteshield, has been at the Government Institute at Carlisle, PA, also at college at Hanover, in Indiana and finished at the Haskell Institute. The boys are taught reading, writing, and arithmetic, with carpentry and waggon-building and tailoring. The girls learn reading, writing, arithmetic, sewing and cooking. The pupils' uniforms are all made by the boys and girls, under the superintendance of capable teachers. The girls wear pinafores and stuff dresses; the boys, dark jean suits, somewhat similar to the uniform of the U.S. troops, and soft hats.

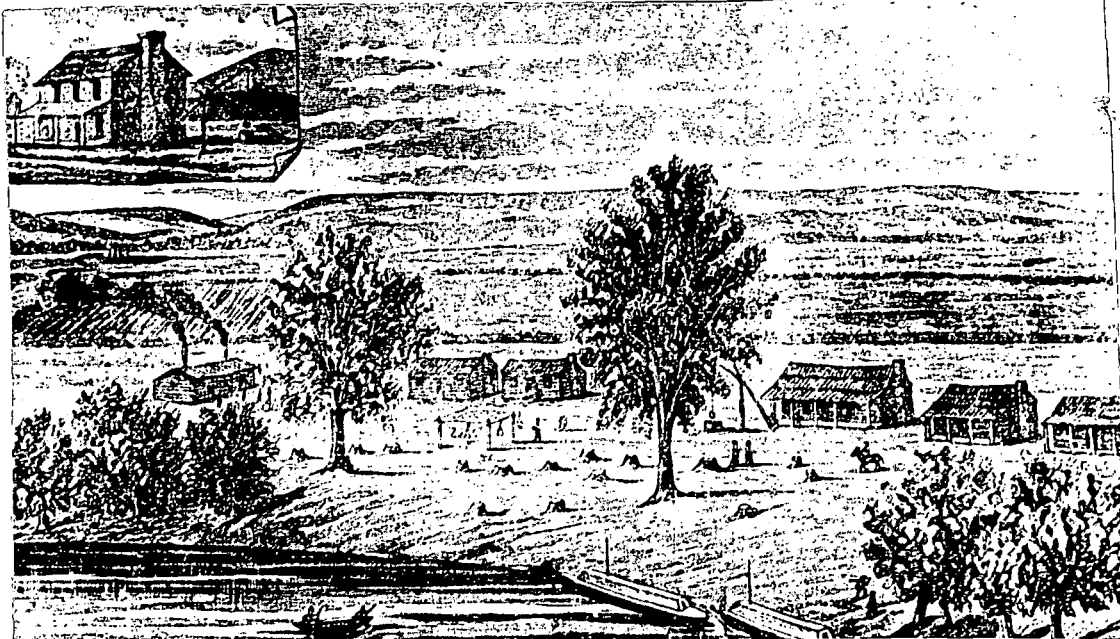

DANIEL BOONE'S SETTLEMENT

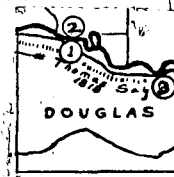

In September of 1827, Daniel Morgan BOONE, son of Daniel BOONE of Kentucky was appointed "farmer" to the Kansas Indians and was employed by the federal government to teach the Indians the art of agriculture. His settlement was located seven miles northwest of present Lawrence on the south line of present Jefferson Co. His son Napoleon, born Aug 22 1828 appears to have been the first white child born in Kansas

TRADING POSTS and MISSIONS WHICH SERVED the INDIANS in DOUGLAS COUNTY, KANSAS

- 1.) Trading house of Frederick CHOUTEAU established at Horseshoe Lake (present day Lakeview) in 1829. Abandoned in 1831.
- 2.) Trading post of Frederick CHOUTEAU, established ca. 1827-28 and removed in 1830 to the mouth of Mission Creek in Shawnee Co.
- 3.) Methodist Episcopal Mission (Shawnee) established in 1848 near the mouth of the Wakarusa under the charge of Rev. Abraham STILL. Abandoned in 1857. Site was on Sec 8, Twp 13, R 21 E.



INDIAN PLACE-NAMES

EUDORA-town in Douglas County named for Chief Paschal FISH's daughter, Eudora.

WAKARUSA (river, township and first name of Lawrence, KS)- Legend has it that an Indian maiden was crossing the stream on horseback until she realized that she was half immersed and cried out "Wau-ka-ru-sa" (or "hip-deep"). The stream was named accordingly. Another definition of WAKARUSA is: "the river upon whose banks grew the wild milkweed".

SARCOXIE-(name of the township in Jefferson Co. from which Grant Township was formed)-named for Chief Sarcoxie (Sah-coc-sa), chief of the Turtle band of Delaware Indians who lived north of Lawrence and ran a ferry from present-day North Lawrence to Lawrence, KS.

INDIANS of DOUGLAS COUNTY, KANSAS

The earliest European mention of the great tribes whose homes and hunting grounds extended over the region afterwards known as the Territory of Kansas is on a map by Father Marquette. This map was drawn subsequent to the voyage of Marquette and Joliet in the summer of 1673. It was for one of these tribes, the KANSA (Cansez, Konza etc.) that the State of Kansas was later named.

In Douglas County, Kansas the two principal tribes who settled the area were the Shawnees and the Delawares. They had arrived in Kansas in the 1820's and by the time that most of them were sent to other reservations in the 1850's and 1860's many had ~~already~~ moved as many as four times.

THE SHAWNEE

By treaties of June 1825, the Shawnee were removed to a tract of land "50 miles square situated west of the State of Missouri and within the purchase lately made from the Osage." This tract included all of Douglas County except Grant township. (See map on inside of back cover). Aided by the missionaries who settled among them, the Shawnees soon were living a relatively comfortable life with log houses and well cultivated fields. The Shawnees eventually established a form of government and in their election of 1855, they elected the following members: COUNCIL: Henry BLUE JACKET, DOUGHERTY, TOOLEY, Simon HILL and TUCKER. CLERK: Matthew KING; INTERPRETER: Charles BLUE JACKET and, PRINCIPAL CHIEFS: Joseph PARKS and Graham ROGERS.

One of the first hotels in Kansas was one built and operated by Shawnee Indian, Paschal FISH in present-day Eudora.* The "FISH HOUSE" (Hotel) was a welcome haven for many a white settler passing through Douglas County in territorial days and afterward. In an article entitled "Reminiscences of 1855" by C.H. Dickson in Collections of the Kansas State Historical Society, Mr. Dickson recalled arriving with fellow travellers at Mr. FISH's hotel in 1855:

"The room assigned to us had a large open fireplace, one bed, and perhaps a half-dozen chairs. Think of 32 people, people, men, women and children together, sleeping in that space of 16 by 16 feet. Well we did, somehow, using the bedding from our wagons. First we had supper. Our hostess had to set table four or five times, for so many...it was late bedtime before my supper was over, and when I went to the sleeping room...on looking for bedding, I found that one buffalo robe was all that was left me."

Shawnee Indian, Robert ROBERTTAILE held the original land patent to a tract of land later to become the City of Lawrence. In 1854 the Shawnees numbered about 900 including about 20 white men who had married into the tribe. On May 10, 1854, the Shawnee tribe ceded to the U.S. the entire tract set apart for them in 1825.

The government retroceded to the tribe land amounting to about 200 acres per tribal member, mostly in Johnson County. As soon as the land was thrown open to white settlement, squatters came from neighboring states to secure claims in Douglas County.

THE DELAWARE

Present-day Grant township in Douglas County, Kansas was part of the tract of land which the Delaware Indians settled in 1829. The Delawares claimed to be the parent stem from which the numerous Algonquin tribes descended and were referred to by other tribes as "Grandfather". Their earliest known home was in the lower part of Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

In 1818, the Delawares relinquished their claim to the State of Indiana and were assigned lands in Missouri where they removed to the James Fork of the White River until the treaty of 1829 when that tract was relinquished and they were granted lands in Kansas "in the fork of the Kansas and Missouri rivers extending up the Kansas River to the Kansas (Indian) line and up the Missouri River to Camp Leavenworth and thence by a line drawn westerly leaving a space ten miles wide, north of the Kansas boundary line for an outlet. (Ft. Leavenworth was reserved to the U.S.) (See map on inside of back cover).

The U.S. government erected a grist and saw mill for the Delaware and furnished them cattle. Some of the Delaware became farmers, but the majority subsisted chiefly by hunting and serving as guides to whites travelling West.

In the book, Beyond The Mississippi, by Albert Richardson in 1867 there is a good description of a dark rainy night in 1858 when Mr. Richardson, unable to travel any farther in the inclement weather came upon the log house of a Delaware family not many miles out of Lawrence.

"It was a single room ten or 12 feet square. There were three men, dressed in coats and pantaloons, who had long course black hair...and suspicious countenances" and "a stout squaw, cheery and open-faced (who) wore zinc ear-rings as large as silver dollars". "Crouching beside her was a girl of 8 years also wearing the metallic ear-rings" and "from a swinging hammock an Indian papoose of American descent"... "Supper over the little girl filled and lighted an earthen pipe with reed stem a foot long. Smoking a few whiffs she handed it to her mother."

In 1854 the Delaware ceded most of their lands to the U.S. At this time the tribe numbered about 900. A large portion of the tribe removed to Indian territory in 1868 and the rest to their homes at the Wichita Agency.

HASKELL INSTITUTE: CELEBRATING IT'S CENTENNIAL

DUDLEY HASKELL

While Haskell Institute commemorates one hundred years of operation in 1985, the story of Indian schools reaches back to 1879. In that year a law was passed establishing industrial training schools for the youth of Indian tribes.

The first school was near Carlisle, Pennsylvania and directed by the original promoter of Indian education, Captain Richard H. Pratt. Plans for additional schools in more central locations were soon being developed. In July, 1881 the Lawrence Tribune observed that Lawrence had a good chance to be selected as the site of one of these schools.

Major James M. Haworth, Inspector of Indian schools, was to decide where to place the schools. As an inducement to place a school here, local citizens worked hard in the summer of 1882 on a fund-raising campaign which netted \$10,000, which was used to purchase a 280 acre farm. The farm was offered as a campus for an Indian school and by the end of the year Haworth decided to locate a school here.

In 1883, architect John G. Haskell prepared plans for two dormitories and a school building and work began on them in the fall. His brother, Dudley C. Haskell was then Chairman of the Indian Affairs Committee in the House of Representatives. He was an advocate of industrial training schools as worthwhile solutions to the Indian question. By 1883, Dudley Haskell was a rising Republican politician and a member of the powerful Ways and Means Committee. When Dudley Haskell died on December 16, 1883 from a chronic kidney disease known at that time as Bright's disease, he was a relatively young man.

The Lawrence Journal stated four days later "Probably at no time in the history of our city has a death brought such universal sorrow and regret as that of our deceased statesman." Dudley Haskell's life left a distinct memory of his value and inspired a deep initial interest in the cause of Indian education which was assessed in the September 21, 1884 Lawrence Journal. It stated that Dudley:

"studied the Indian question closely. . . had he lived he would have accomplished a vast amount in aiding the cause of Indian education!"

The newspaper spoke of the choice of Haskell as a name for the Lawrence Indian school as being "a merited compliment."

Today Lawrence residents think of the name "Haskell" and the Indian Junior College as united which in one way represents the commitment of the people of this area to Indian education. The Centennial Committee at Haskell has brought in many special programs and helped all of us to see the great diversity and rich culture of Native Americans. These Centennial activities are also leading to a rebirth of local support and interest in this federal school.

We invite your participation in these activities. We hope you will visit the exhibit, "Haskell: 100 Years" at the Watkins Community Museum. Other centennial activities upcoming are, "Native American Works from Woolaroc, The Frank Phillips Foundation Museum, Bartlesville", at the Adams Alumni Center February 24-April 5, and "Contemporary Native American Art - curated by the Gardiner Art Gallery of Oklahoma State University, Stillwater" at the Art and Design Gallery, University of Kansas, March 17 - April 5.

OBITUARY OF FRED INGALLS of HASKELL INSTITUTE

From the Lawrence Daily Journal and Evening Tribune.
November 10, 1892

"Haskell Items"

Last Saturday evening Fred Ingalls, a Modoc, a bright and interesting boy of thirteen years of age died after an illness of two weeks. He belonged to that tribe that defied so stubbornly in the lava beds of Oregon the attempts of our government in '72-3 to send them to their reservations and finally were starved out and obliged to capitulate but not until they had treacherously put to death our United States commissioners, General Candy and Dr. Thomas who were attempting to make a treaty with them. For this act their leader Captain Jack and three of his followers were executed. The tribe was then sent to the Lanpan Agency, I.T., near Baxter Springs Kas. and were for several years under the influence of those consecrated and honored missionaries, Asa and Emmeline Tuttle. Since their removal, however, the mortality among them has been great and many have died.

Fred was the last of five brothers, his father and mother having also died. He was a very bright, interesting boy, quick at numbers, readily grasping ideas, speaking English well, of an active, nervous temperament but never seeming very strong or rugged since he came. It is said that he planted the germs of disease in the territory before coming here by the kind of gypsy life he led, camping out and sleeping in the open air. Monday we laid him to rest in the little Indian cemetery and the service at the grave, with the long row of school mates and friends standing by with reverent looks and uplifted hats paying the last mark of respect and love to their young school fellow was touching and impressive. It is the first death that has occurred at the Institute for nine months. There are four other members of the tribe here, a daughter of Scar Faced Charley who was with Capt Jack at the massacre of the commissioners, and three boys, one called Asa Tuttle, from the missionary, a very bright, interesting boy.

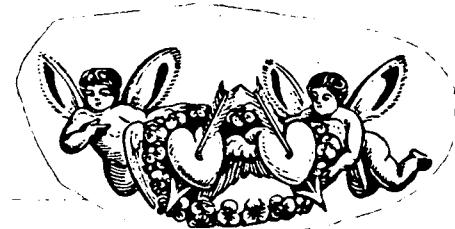

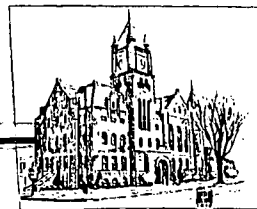

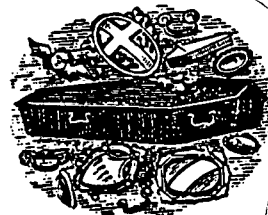

MOSES KEOKUK, CHIEF OF THE SAUK AND FOX INDIANS

JAILED IN LAWRENCE, KANSAS

On November 23, 1868, Moses Keokuk, Chief of the Sauk and Fox tribe was jailed overnight in the Lawrence jail with three companions, Mo-ko-ho-ko, Ka-ka-pe-quode and Muscoe-tah, for the offense of "going to Washington, DC." They were on their way there to see the "Great White Father" to protest the treaty proclaimed October 14, 1868 whereby the Sauk and Fox lands of Osage Co., KS were ceded to the government where it "went to settlers in lots of 160 acres, at not less than \$1.50 per acre."

The U.S. Commissioner of Indian Affairs, Charles Mix when he learned of their proposed visit to Washington, had advised Thomas Murphy, Indian Superintendent for Kansas that no delegation of Indians "in your superintendency will be allowed to visit this place during the present fiscal year...for the reason that there are no funds at the disposal of the Department...to use to defray their necessary expenses. Keokuk when read this statement replied that he had money enough to defray this expense and left with five others for Lawrence, Ks in November of 1868. Agent Wiley followed and made an affidavit for the arrest of Keokuk and the other chiefs. The case was brought before the U.S. Commissioner, W.P. Montgomery and was set for the next term. Keokuk would not pay bail and was ordered to jail. However, he eventually did reach his destination according to the New York Tribune 14 December 1868 issue:

"WASHINGTON, DEC. 12.—To-day a delegation of the Sac and Fox Indians of the Mississippi, in charge of Keokuk, their head chief, accompanied the Hon. Sidney Clarke of Kansas, to see the President and make known their grievances. The Indians were attired in their highest style. Wan-com-mo wore a coat loaded with ten or twelve pounds of beads and wampum, and fringed with buckskin strings a foot long. Two of the chiefs wore necklaces of nails of grizzly bear's claws, strung on an otter skin. These nails are about five inches in length, and the necklaces cost hundreds of dollars each. The President kindly received the painted warriors, and assured them his protection. They have come to Washington without the sanction of the Indian Office, to effect, if possible, the removal of swindling officers on their reserve. Notice has hitherto appeared of their arrest and imprisonment by their agent, and of their suing Commissioner Mix for false imprisonment. Their arrest, though sanctioned by the Interior Department, the President disapproves. The following is the paper which they submitted to Mr. Johnson:

"To his Excellency the President:

"The undersigned, chiefs from the Sac and Fox tribes of the Mississippi, respectfully represent to your excellency that their agent, Albert Wiley, having been guilty of misconduct in office, should be removed for the following reasons:

1. For giving the exclusive right to trade with their tribe to one William Whistler, who charged them exorbitant prices for the necessaries of life, amounting to twice or three times as much as the same articles cost outside the reservation.
2. That besides refusing any person license to trade with the tribe, the agent removes, or threatens to remove, the chiefs, for not advising their people to trade with this licensed monopoly, and that the agent represents to their people that the government wishes them to pay such exorbitant prices.
3. That when they desired to come to Washington to obtain redress for their grievances, the agent declared that he would deprive Keokuk of his position, which he has held for over twenty years, and would arrest the whole party.
4. That agent Wiley followed them to Lawrence, Kan., and procured their arrest and imprisonment, not for any crime, but because they desired to represent their wrongs to the department.

5. For misrepresenting to us that our last treaty was ratified [proclaimed?], and requesting and influencing us to sign a deed for a strip of land two and a quarter miles wide and four miles long, during the absence of the United States interpreter, thereby taking us unprepared, and forcing us to convey valuable property to the detriment of the tribes.

"For these gross outrages of the agent, and for his collusion with the trader, we, the chiefs of the Sac and Fox tribes of the Mississippi, respectfully ask you to remove both agent Albert Wiley and the trader William Whistler, and appoint an agent with instructions to license at least two traders for the tribe. We come to your excellency claiming protection against the rapacity of those who desire to swindle us out of the little we have. We have full faith that the government desires to do us justice, and we beg you will grant our prayer and see justice done us.

SHAWNEE INDIAN, PASCHAL FISH OF EUDORA, KANSAS

William Jackson was a white man taken captive by the Shawnee Indian Tribe of Ohio when a young man and raised with the Shawnee. He was given the name of Paschal FISH. Upon the death of Captain Rogers, the leader of the small Shawnee Band near Cape Girardeau, Mo., leadership was given to Paschal FISH.

In the Indian Removal Act of 1830, the Fish Band of Shawnee moved to northeast Kansas on Shawnee Reserve lands near the present town of Turner, Kansas, near Kansas City. Chief FISH had a son, Paschal Jr., born in 1804 and at least four sons; Charles, born 1813, died 1869; Isaac, b. 1833 in Kansas Territory; Jesse, died 1866. John and William and probably some daughters, one probably marrying Josephus Pascal.

Paschal FISH, Sr., died in 1834 and his son, born near St. Louis, MO and named for his father assumed leadership of the Fish Tribe at age 30. He was educated in a Friends Mission School and was married and had some children whose names we have not found. He was an interpreter for the Shawnee Mission Manual Labor School, his father had requested from the government. His wife and children might have died in one of the terrible cholera or smallpox epidemics that wiped out whole villages of Indians as they came in contact with the white man. He was a cousin of the Shawnee Prophet.

Paschal FISH, Jr. was also a blacksmith for the government, a business man and a Methodist Minister. He was described as a kind Christian man. His second wife was Hester Zane, daughter of Hannah (Dickinson) Zane, a Wyandot Indian. They married Oct. 14 1847 and she died four and one half years later on April 17, 1852. Their children were: Obadiah-b. 1848; Eudora-b. 1850 and twins-Leander Jackson and Andrew-b. 1852. Eudora and Andrew went to live with Grandmother Zane. Paschal must have remarried between 1852 and 1855 as his wife, Consort FISH died in the cholera epidemic of 1855. Obadiah and Leander Jackson must have stayed with their father as they were living in 1860 and listed on Eudora's deed. Obadiah is missing on government rolls after 1855 so may have died then also.

Paschal then married Martha Captain (b. 1814, d. 1860) at age 46. Wife No. 5 was Mary Ann (McClure) Steel and he acquired a step-daughter, Anna Ham, in 1857 census. She may have been Martha's daughter. Anna married Henry W. Edmonds (Edwards), also called Anna (Harvey) Edmonds in 1863 and had 1 child.

Paschal's last wife was Jane Quinney and she went with him to Oklahoma in 1872 and is on the Quapaw rolls and died in 1873.

It was probably in the 1840's when Paschal FISH came to the Eudora area, as he and brother, Charles operated a ferry over the Kansas River at the mouth of the Wakarusa and part of Col. Doniphan's Army ferried across the Fish ferry enroute to the Mexican War as they traveled over the Military Branch of the Santa Fe Trail from Leavenworth through the present site of Eudora to Willow Springs to join the regular Santa Fe Trail. Paschal requested a Mission School in the Eudora area as his father had done and the Methodist Church started the Wakarusa Shawnee Indian Mission here in 1851. It closed in 1854 due to the slavery problem. Dr. Abram Still and his two doctor sons, his wife and one son's wife, Mrs. Still, helped at the Mission. Paschal's brother, Charles was interpreter at the school. The building reverted to Paschal and in 1857 a group of Germans agreed to buy 774½ acres from him to found a town. In 1860, when the Eudora deed was signed by Paschal, he was said to have been chief of 600 Shawnees, many half white blood.

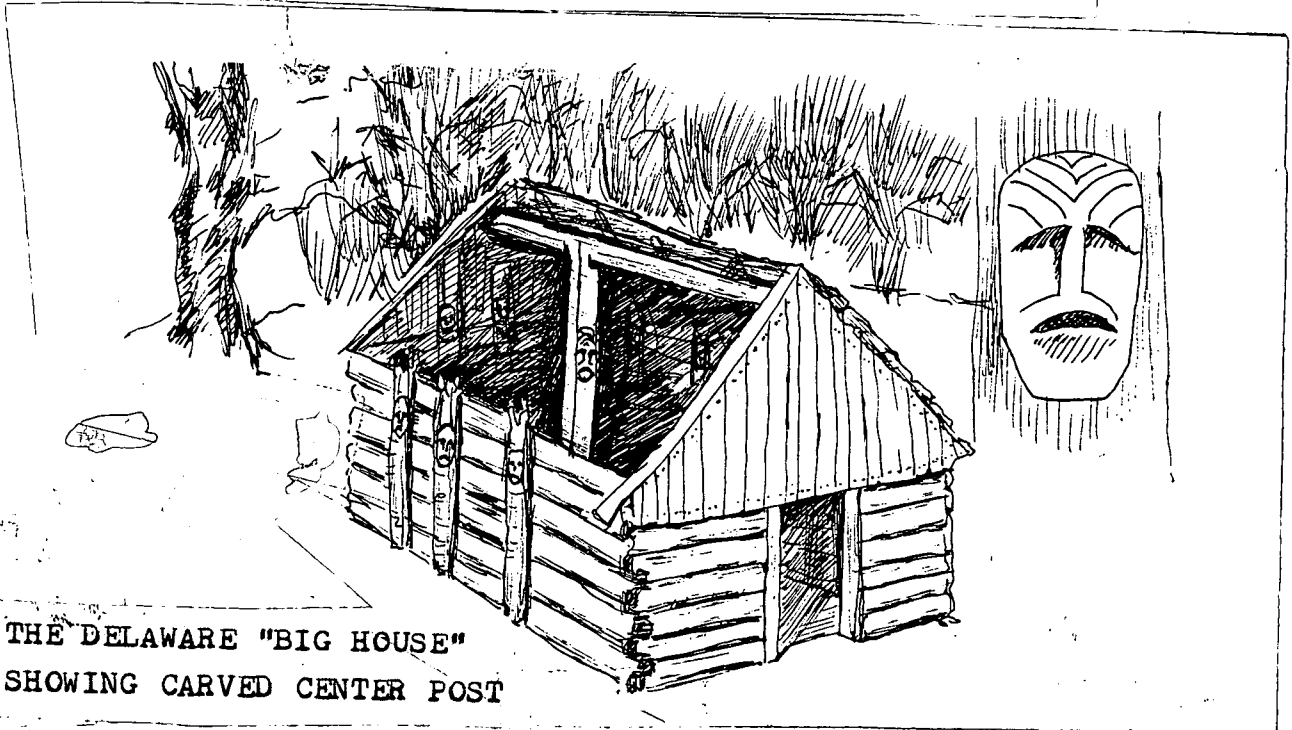
Paschal FISH built a hotel or inn on the Fremont-Westport Trail from the Kansas City area to Lawrence, located at the south edge of the present town of Eudora. He sold it in 1872 when he went to Oklahoma.

From 1857 to 1866, Paschal FISH preached for the Methodist Church in Eudora and other nearby areas as one of the Circuit Ministers to the Indians. He died on the Oklahoma-Kansas border February of 1894 by freezing to death. Paschal had an orphan, Judge Cato FISH in his family in 1857-1858.

"The traditional Delawares refused to send their children to school or the Christian Mission and they continued to observe their ancient religion. They gathered together each fall in the Big House-which stood in a cluster of walnut trees, later known as Bismarck Grove, about 6 miles east of Lawrence-dancing around the sacred centerpost with the carved faces of M'sing"(masked spirit)

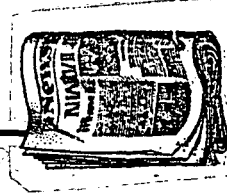


THE DELAWARE "BIG HOUSE"

KANWAKA NEWSPAPER ITEMS

George RICHARDSON has a new "hay hand". It is supposed he will be a heavyweight pitcher for he already weighs twelve pounds.

From Report of Special Committee to Investigate
the Troubles in Kansas, 34th Congress, 1st Session
1856

SAMUEL SMITH called and sworn.

I came into the Territory on the 1st of April, 1855, from Illinois and settled near Lecompton. Mr. Joseph Oakley and myself bought a claim there of Mr. L. D. Hendricks. Immediately after we took possession, Mr. Oakley left for Michigan for his family. I remained there. I went to Kansas City to take down Mr. Oakley, leaving my boys to build a cabin on my portion of the claim, Mr. Oakley and myself having divided it. A committee waited upon me after my return and informed me I was trespassing upon a claim owned by S. J. Jones, afterwards sheriff, and a Dr. Davis. A gentleman calling himself Dr. Davis was present, and told me this. They ordered me to appear before a commission established at Benecia, but I did not do so. It was the 8th of April that we took possession of the claim. On the 2d of May, Mr. Jones came with a party. I was sick and in bed in Mr. Oakley's cabin, as mine had not much accommodation in it. Mr. Oakley's cabin was on the claim when we bought it. Mr. Jones told me he had burned my cabin, and told me I must leave the claim, that it was his. There was some conversation about the penalties of this association, among which were hanging, tarring and feathering, &c. I was somewhat threatened with these penalties in the name of the association. I have never been able to ascertain that either Jones or Davis had ever been in possession of this claim.

I did not leave, but continued to work on the claim. I found my cabin burned down. On the 28th of May I was invited to assist a man by the name of Hancock, who lived near by, in building a house, and went over there for that purpose. We were cutting logs a short distance from where the house was to be erected; and shortly after we commenced work, an alarm was given that a crowd of armed men were coming towards us. There were some half a dozen of us at work, and we all left immediately and went to the house that Mr. Hancock was then living in. When we got there, I saw a crowd of twenty-five or thirty men coming towards the house; and when they got there we were ordered by Mr. Jones, the leader, to disperse. We stood our ground, and they marched up in front of the house. Jones ordered the crowd to make ready and take aim, and in that position they came up. They were all armed with shot guns, rifles, and revolvers. Among them I recognized Mr. Jones, Mr. Evans Todhunter, Mr. Roderick, now postmaster in Lecompton, Mr. Taylor, a lawyer, Mr. Ellison, called "Squire Ellison," and a Mr. Gentry. When the crowd had got near enough to fire, after they had taken aim, Mr. Ellison called out not to shoot. We showed no resistance, but stood perfectly quiet. Mr. Ellison spoke to me, and said we ought to be careful, for some of the boys would shoot. After some conversation, Mr. Jones ordered Mr. Hancock to leave the premises, which, at first, he refused to do; but after some threats, he took out his goods from the house and went off. I understood at that time that Jones was

postmaster at Westport, Missouri. Mr. Hancock's family were turned out of doors, and, for some weeks afterwards, I saw his goods out on the open prairie, until he could build a house for himself. At that time I had some conversation with Jones, after Mr. Ellison had told me he had been to my cabin, and had advised me to leave it, possibly for fear Jones and his party would turn me out by force. Mr. Jones, in conversation, acknowledged that he had threatened to shoot me if he found me in Oakley's cabin again. I returned to the cabin after that, and sent two of my boys out to arouse the neighbors. The rest of us went to work to fortify the cabin, so that we might defend it, by loading our guns and knocking out some chinks between the logs to put our guns through. I found written on the cabin door, "You are hereby ordered to leave these premises by 4 o'clock this evening." This was written with red chalk, but had no signature. About 4 o'clock, Jones came to the cabin, leading a crowd. I went out and had a conversation with him. He was anxious for me to leave without further trouble, and insisted that I must leave at all hazards. After consulting my friends, I concluded to leave the cabin; and we all did so, and went off from it for a short distance, and stopped to see what would be done. Jones went back and consulted his friends for a while, and then some man of the crowd went up on the roof of the cabin and set the shingles on fire. I was not near enough to recognize that man. The cabin was burned down. One of my sons and a Mr. Grout went to the cabin and took my goods out after the cabin was set on fire. I left the claim then for several months, until after Mr. Oakley returned. Jones put a man in a house outside of the claim we had bought, and they took our rails we had cut, and raised a crop of corn on our claim. Mr.

Jones never lived in that house, and did not live in the Territory, so far as I know. After Mr. Oakley returned, he built a house on his claim, and we then went on the claim again and occupied it. I went on my share of the claim shortly after Mr. Oakley did, and I commenced building a house. In the conversation, at the time Mr. Hancock was turned out of the house he was living in, Mr. Jones told me, when I threatened to apply for civil redress, that Judge Lecompton was interested in the claim. In September last, an injunction was served upon me, issued by Judge Lecompton, forbidding me to commit any more waste by cutting timber on this land; and the case is still before his court, and I have ever since been under that injunction. After my house was burned, I went to Tecumseh, and applied to the grand jury for redress against these persons for having burned my house and threatened my life, but they refused to give me any hearing. This was before the county lines were established. Attorney General Isaacs told me there was no law in regard to burning houses or mobbing persons, and they had no jurisdiction over it.

 secretary for the day.

Roll called and twenty answered to
 their names.

On motion the church was named
 "Fairview Brethren Church."

Resolved that our church district embrace
 all of Douglas County Kansas lying south of
 the Wakarusa river, with the privilege of permittin
 any member or members living outside of said
 district where no organized Church of the Brethren
 exists to attach themselves to the "Fairview
 Brethren Church." Carried unanimous.

The following preamble and resolution wa
 then read and ~~ad~~ motion was adopted:

be it resolved that the Brethren of the "Fairview Brethren Church" adopt the Bible in its entirety as the bond of union in all things pertaining to life and godliness, and their perfect law to govern the church in all things necessary to salvation.

On motion Joseph Michael was chosen Elder of the church.

After setting forth two for the purpose of selecting one for deacon, prayer was offered asking for the right selection, and the choice fell on Daniel Ulrich.

After setting forth two others, and prayer, the choice fell on D. P. Weybright.

After setting forth two others and prayer, the choice fell on S. W. Meetaker.

The deacons were then installed in their offices by laying on of hands and prayer.

On motion S. W. Meetaker was elected clerk.

On motion Adam Tuttle was elected treasurer.

A collection was then taken up amounting to three dollars twentyfive cents (\$3.25).

After prayer, meeting adjourned.

A LETTER FROM PALMYRA TOWNSHIP IN 1859

Prairie City, P.O. Douglas Co., Ks
July 11th 1859

Hon. Eli K. Price, Phila. Pa

Dear Sir

Permit me to address a few lines to you, on a subject however, on which it appears we feel alike. I am a missionary of the Moravian, (United Brethran church) and have been in the Territory ever since 1846, with a short interruption. I have seen the operation on the frontier among the semicivilized Indian and have seen the Indian in his original state. And having been at the federal City for a number of times about Indian affairs and having made the acquaintance of many agents for the Indians, I received considerable inside into that branch of Government. And when courts were established in this Territory I made it an object to learn in how far the Indian would be protected by it. But, alas! all is calculated to exterminate the Indian and destroy or hinder all the good which is done by benevolent Societies. The master stroke, however, to accomplish the object has been done a few weeks since by the expounding of the laws in relation for the protection of the Indians. It is decided by the U.S. Supreme Court for this territory, that there is no law in existence, by which a person can be reached(?), who trespasses on the Indians rights and that the U.S. has no rights to procecute a person making a settlement on Indian's land.

For two years I followed up such cases, having seen hundred of cords of wood carried away, building timber and rails. Have seen how the Indian soil, was cultivated by intruders, houses built on their land and making the effort to drive the Indian from his own home. I thought it impossible that person, guilty of such crimes, and when 4 to 5 witnesses stand ready to testify to it, should be dismissed and yet some 20 such cases were dismissed, that have made settlements on not more than 4 sections of Indian land and besides these I saw about 50 other cases dismissed. My heart failed me and I was ready to cry: "Lord it is enough now, take away my life for I am no better than my fathers." I had no more hope, for if the Indians can not be protected, for the averlesioness? of the white man, if there is no penalty that he has to fear, every stick of timber will be taken from the Indian, he will be harrassed day after day, and I have already written to the officers of my church that I consider the mission work closed in Kansas and that I were ready to return home.

But strange as it may appear, it is so never the less that my mind recased to the east. I felt assured there was no hope in the west of a reaction, in the Indian's behalf, but I had to believe, if the east could only be enlightened on the Indian treatment and their wants, they were not so corrupt, but would yet rise up for the rescue of the Indian: if there were only a man of spirit and ability to revele and arouse them. That is my only hope: And it was cheering beyond measure when a few days ago, on a visit to the Ottawa Indians, I learned of my friend John JONES, that there were societies forming for that purpose. I read the proceedings of the meetings both of N.Y. and Phila. I rejoined at the spirit manifested in the resolutions. I read your remarks and a hope gleaned up in my darkened vision, that the wicked and destructive course now pressed? towards the Indians, may yet be arrested. If we were only left alone with them we could do much for their good, but the ruinous course has gathered strength by its age, and power by popularity and the missionary can now only think of how to remove the evil and he could see no way to accomplish it. But the popular voice can. I do not expect much from christian denominations in this direction, the united masses can only effect it. And from the bottom of my heart I give you God's speed. "Come over and help us!"

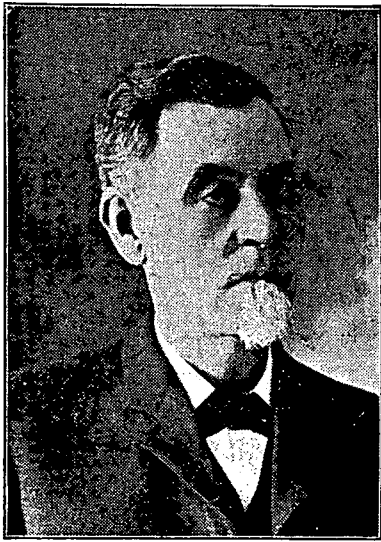
I would now suggest that in my opinion, you ought to investigate or see it done, or at least agestate it, whether it be a fact, that there is no law or statute by which one can reach trespassers on Indian rights. I know well that there is a penalty of one thousand dollars against making a settlement and c. on Indian lands. But Judge Pettett decided "that since the land belongs to the Indian and not to the U.S. the U.S. has no right to create a revenue out of that which does not belong to it, that the Indians should bring the suit. "Well we did by injunction and by indictment for the Indians and for the U.S. but nothing would do. And a Indian to bring suit, in his name is nonsense. How can a ward sue? Yet I am not a lawyer and do therefore not understand the law.

Hoping that these lines may find favor.

J. C. WATTS,

Candidate for Reelection as Commissioner from the 1st District, subject to the Republican Primaries, June 6th, 1902.

HON. JOHN CRIMP WATTS, who has made his home in Kansas since the fall of 1856, was born near Plymouth, Devonshire, England, September 3, 1835, a son of John and Elizabeth (Crimp) Watts, natives of the same shire. His father, who was the son of a stone mason, learned that trade at an early age and after a time began to take contracts. While engaged in filling a contract he accidentally fell from the belfry of a church and was so injured that he died six months later. Besides his wife (who came to Kansas and died here at the age of fifty-six years) he left four children, of whom John Crimp is the oldest and the only survivor. Isaac, the second son, was a soldier in the British army and served in India, but resigned, came to America and settled in Kansas, where he died. Thomas, who was also a soldier in India, came to Kansas in the early days and remained here until 1879, when he went east, and since then all trace of him has been lost. Mary, the only daughter, married A. Woods, and died in Lawrence.

After his father's death our subject was apprenticed to his partner, with whom he remained until he was eighteen. In 1853 he came to America on the sailer "Rose," and landed in Quebec after a voyage of eight weeks. Going to Cleveland, Ohio, he worked as a stone mason and bricklayer. In 1854 he went to Chicago and Waukegan, Ill., in both of which places he found employment and began contracting. In the fall of 1856 he came to Kansas. He was then a young man of twenty-one years. With all the enthusiasm of youth he began life in a new country amid hardships and difficulties. Going to Pottawatomie County he took up the first claim near Louisville, and there he built a house and made improvements, retaining the place for four years. As he passed through Lawrence he had noticed some stone buildings, and thinking it might be possible for him to secure work, he returned to

this city in February, 1857, and began contracting and building. In order to hold his claim on Rock Creek, every six months for two years he made a trip to it, starting from Lawrence on foot at noon and walking twenty-five miles that day, and twenty-nine the next, reaching the land after dark. Four years after he had settled in Lawrence a man offered him \$1,000 for it. He accepted the offer, deposited the money in a bank which failed three days later, entailing a total loss to him. Undiscouraged, however, he continued his work as contractor, and in time became successful, he and his uncle, Abraham Watts, being partners. He built the Miller block, G. A. R. building, Poehler block, the grocery building owned by John Jones, and many residences in this city. About 1890 he practically retired from business, although since then he has consented to take a few important contracts, among them that of the library building in the University of Kansas (1894), and the Fowler shops at the university (1898). He is the owner of considerable valuable property in Lawrence, and has dealt extensively in real estate. During the antebellum days he experienced all the terrors of border warfare, and remembers well the perils of the Quantrell raid that brought death and disaster to the people of Lawrence. At the time of the Price raid he was mustered into Company A, Third Kansas Militia, under Captain Wheeler as corporal, and went with his regiment down to the Blue.

In Lawrence Mr. Watts married Fannie, daughter of Thomas Collier, who came from Pennsylvania to Lawrence in 1857. They became the parents of six children, of whom Mary died at fourteen years, and the others are at home. Mr. Watts voted the Republican ticket until the Tilden campaign, since which time he has been a Democrat. He is serving his third term as chairman of the Democratic county committee. For three terms he represented the third and fourth wards in the city council, where he was chairman of the committee on streets, alleys and bridges. For two years he held the office of street commissioner. On the Republican ticket, in 1874, he was elected to the legislature, receiving a majority of six hundred over Alexander Banks. In the session of 1875 he secured the passage of a bill assessing property and stock at the place of their location. Not wishing to be the recipient of any favors from the railroads, he sent back all passes presented to him. For two years he was a director of the state penitentiary under Governor Glick. After becoming a Democrat he was a candidate for sheriff and treasurer of Douglas County, but his party being in the minority he failed of election. However, he overcame a majority of one thousand and was defeated by only one hundred votes. He is a demitted member of the Odd Fellows, and belongs to the Fraternal Aid Association, the Ancient Order of United Workmen and Washington Post No. 12, G. A. R.

WHERE WORDEN CHURCH GOT IT'S NAME

From Worden United Methodist Church Bulletin

Until 1906 our church had been known as Willow Springs. It started in 1869 as a part of the Lawrence Circuit and later as a part of the Eudora Circuit. In 1905 Deer Creek (now Stull) and Willow Springs comprised a circuit. Next we became a full-time appointment and the name was changed to Worden, for the community in which our church is located, rather than the township. The town of Willow Springs was an important stop on the Santa Fe Trail, was located 5 miles northeast of Worden (where the German Baptist Church is now located). The Willow Springs postoffice was closed November 1, 1900.

Worden's history as a post office address (although we still get mail addressed to Worden, Kansas) is found in KANSAS POST OFFICES by Robert W. Baughman: "A post office was established on September 22, 1884. John F. Schott was the first postmaster. This farming community is located east of Globe in south Douglas County. The post office was discontinued on May 31, 1895; reopened September 9, 1896, but was permanently closed on July 15, 1904."

The question of where Worden got its name seems to have two possible answers. I am told by Raymond Schott, grandson of John Fredrick Schott, first and only Worden postmaster (this postoffice was located on the Fred Turner farm) that close to Oldenburg, Germany, where the Schott family came from, was a town by the name of Worden. The Schott family had connections with the Worden Church, Miss Gertrude E. Schott was a member from 1909 until her death November 25, 1942. Two children of

Hugo and Ethel Schott were baptized March 30, 1913; their names were: Lola and Victor, grandchildren of the postmaster.

If Mr. Schott was consulted about the name for the new postoffice, it may well have been named for Worden, Germany. However there is another possibility: "Lorenzo J. Worden, born April 13, 1828, in Stephentown, N.Y. a descendant of Peter Worden of Clayton, England. Young Lorenzo was educated at Ithaca and Elmira Academies and taught school for eight years. He secured further education at Alfred University. On tour through Virginia and North & South Carolina he witnessed the violence of slavery, and was determined to come to Kansas to help make it a Free State. He married Jane E. Wormley, June 7, 1854, and taught school one year to provide necessary funds to go to Kansas and participate in the struggle for freedom. They arrived in Lawrence, October 27, 1855. He located on a claim one mile west of Lawrence, and farmed until 1862, when he entered the office of internal revenue as chief clerk and assistant assessor for the State of Kansas, which position he retained until 1870. He gained considerable respect in that office, and was elected state senator. He was made chairman of the committee on assessments and taxation. In 1873 he was appointed postmaster in Lawrence, second largest post office in the state. He was re-appointed by President Hayes, upon the almost unanimous petition of the city, in 1877. Mrs. Worden was a woman of fine intellectual qualification and finished education. Truly it may be said, never did woman more devotedly sympathize with her husband, nor husband more affectionately appreciate the virtues of a good woman than have Mr. & Mrs. Worden."

Much more has been written of Mr. Worden. In 1868 he purchased a $\frac{1}{2}$ section of land just north of the Howard Broyles farm. Let us now look at the second possibility of where Worden may have gotten its name. The fact of Mr. Worden owning land in this community, being in the Postal System, and a man of considerable prominence, would lead us to believe that, in seeking a name for the new postoffice, they might well have turned to the Honorable Lorenzo J. Worden, teacher, farmer, abolitionist, assessor, state senator, and postmaster.

"Worden Unincorporated" is only a spot on the map to the traveler's eye, or to those speeding down Highway 56 (20th century Santa Fe Trail). If they blink their eyes, they may miss it completely! However, to the neighbors and friends of those two places still carrying the name Worden, Worden Ag. Service, and Worden United Methodist Church, they pleasant places to stop. "Worden Unincorporated" will remain on the map and dear to the hearts of many, while Echo, Willow Springs, Weaver, Franklin and countless other "hopeful cities" have disappeared.

The final chapter on where Worden got its name may not yet be written, but at least we now have two possibilities.
