# Wellsville Area Map

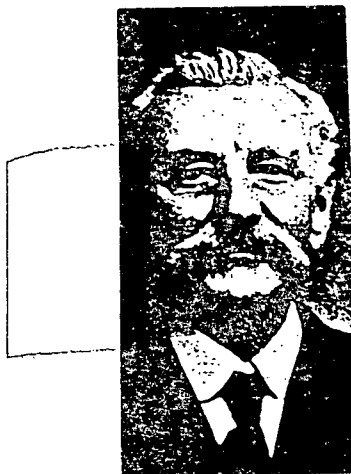


## DIARY OF JOHN WALBORN BATDORF

This is the diary of John Walborn BATDORF. It covers the time of Sept. 1864 to March 1865 while he was in the Union Army. The original belongs to Lois EVERSMEYER, of Douglas County, Kansas. John W. BATDORF was her great grandfather. A sincere thanks to Lois EVERSMEYER for sharing this diary with us. A special thanks also to my sister and her friend for helping me with this project.

All spelling and punctuation was copied as it was written in the diary. If there are any mistakes, I am sorry because the writing was sometimes difficult to read.

The following article is from the Wellsville, Kansas Bicentennial Book 1776-1976. It tells about Mr. BATDORF and family and the map shows the place where they settled.

**John Walborn BATDORF** was born in 1830 in Berks County, Pa. Two years later his parents moved to Champaign County, Ohio where he grew to manhood. In 1852, he drove an ox team across the plains and mountains to California. Three years later he returned and settled in Iowa. He married Charlotte WERTZ of Tipton, Iowa in 1857. He served in the 11th Iowa Volunteer infantry in 1862, was in the battle of Shiloh, later marched with Sherman from Atlanta to the sea and to Washington City where he was discharged at the end of the Civil War.

In 1868, John and Charlotte BATDORF moved with their three children, Emma (HARRISON), Mary Elizabeth (WATSON) and Will by covered wagon to Kansas. They homesteaded on a farm 3 1/2 miles southeast of Wellsville in the Salem Hall school district where they raised cattle and farmed. Two more children, Dave and Cora (BARNETT), were born to them there.

Bettr than any that we have come over eyt in ga. past through McDaner here we past general SHERMAN & any amount of soldiers Nov 18 got up early & Ready to start but did not leave so our Boys went out a foraging got swate potatoes all the Regimet could use & all the fresh pork & beef this for the first time I ha all \_\_\_ to eat since I left home we left camp last night after dark & marching 8 miles & campt near a church it Rained nearly all night Nov 19 got up early & still Raining started at daylight marched 2 miles & got on the Rong Road & had to turn Back making the march for nothing travele 9 mile & bot Breakfast here we com across a Rich man took 400 lbs barrls of flower & barels 4 of sugar molasses pork chicken hogs cattel potatoes & evry thing here J eats some Ripe tomatoes & some nice green lettes our companie was detailed as \_\_\_ guard. here is a big flowering mill on the River \_\_\_ a vry nice water \_\_\_ a nice here is a nice cotton factory \_\_\_ at night as we \_\_\_ to start we got order that we would not leave Before morning Rained hard last night we war on gard at Mr. BUTTS house 40 miles to Maken 75 miles to Andersonville here are some of our prisoners they report one thoisand troups ahead of us to oppose us in our Raid to day we herd that LEA had evacuatd Richmond & was making for us or for the guld Nov 20 Sun. we left camp early very muddy & Bad travling crost the ozalmulga River on pontoons. they Burned for BUTTS all his cotton which amounted over three hundred thousand dollars & Burnt the factory campt at a place Rained all night Nov 21 Rained nearly all day & tuned very coald at night very muddy got in camp at dark had all our clothes wet hard night for sleeping Nov 22 \_\_\_ froz & snowed last night coald all day had Bad marching coald all day & some snow Nov 23 froze hard last night bad \_\_\_ a man this morning to day we marched all day until 9 o clock to night froze hard campt in a field very coald Nov 24 marched about 12 miles campt had a good eat Nov 25 got up early marched hard all day & campt in a good plase plenty wood & water we \_\_\_ 23 our men had a \_\_\_ & cleaned out the ponies at a small town & Burnt the town our loss I do not know But was very small the Rebs loss Considerable 26 Saturday started earley marched 7 miles & crost the River & came 1 mile & cooked diner to day we past the 11 Iowa I saw Tipe BARRET, he told me that the Boys ware all well \_\_\_ says we marched over two hundred miles in 15 days after diner we travailed 8 miles & campt

here we came up with all of the \_\_\_\_\_ here the 3 Iowa & the 2 nd war consolidated we have now over nine hundred men in our Regiment to day J J \_\_\_\_\_ first gray B \_\_\_\_\_ Sunday Nov 27 got up earley & marched 3 miles & came to the Charlston & Macon Railroad her we war ordered to halt & stack arms & tare up the Road & Burn frait house water tank & \_\_\_\_\_ Nov. 28 marched hard \_\_\_\_\_ campt \_\_\_\_\_ near pine swamp N. 29 got up at 3 oclock & we want & Built fire so that we could sea to cross the swamp started Before day light & marched hard all day through swamp & pine land fine timber hardley any farms through here land poor No towns for some time \_\_\_\_\_ Nov 30 got up earley & started on our march crossed 7 or 8 swamps Bad marching all pine timber & sandie soli campt near a swamp in the pine woods weather very hot I sweat as much as I did in harvest. December the 1 1864 very hard marching very wet and muddy & very warm to day I got sick as \_\_\_\_\_ I walked all day & carried my load campt late D. 2 I had my nap sack hauled & I did not get up with my Regiment crost the River on the pontoons & tore up the Rail-Road & Burnt \_\_\_\_\_ Burnt \_\_\_\_\_ to the \_\_\_\_\_ & had my nap sack stolen with Blanket oil & shelter tent socks drawers shirt \_\_\_\_\_ tobacco \_\_\_\_\_ paper & house wife ink & all my trinkets worth about 25 dollars Dec 3 still on the other side of the River taring up the RailRoad Dec 4 had hard all day & campt late in the woods good camp 65 miles from savana Dec 5 got up early & marched very hard all day til dark & campt in the woods water hard to get wood poor \_\_\_\_\_ very \_\_\_\_\_ had sand swamp all day Dec 6 did \_\_\_\_\_ the today I paid \_\_\_\_\_ I was sick all day & night with the Diarhear & pains in my stomache our Regiment for forage & hosses & mules & nigers Dec 7 to day Rained & we marched to the River & crosed & had to skermish for 3 miles from Road 2 of our men got Kild & one woned the Rebs lost more we are 20 miles from \_\_\_\_\_ wher we will have to fight Dec 8 marched hard until 3 oclock & campt & through up Breast works until 12 o clock Then slept until about 4 for up & got Breakfast turned cool last night Robert says we Killed 20 Rebs on the skirmish line & \_\_\_\_\_ some woned & 17 \_\_\_\_\_ Dec. 9 got up early & marched & formed in line & Battel part of the Regiment formed as skirmishes & flankers the Rebs war fortified & we soon Routed them & took 1 piece of artilery found severl dead & some woned We campt early & throwed up Breast works we are 12 miles from savana Dec 10 got up early & Ready to march \_\_\_\_\_ & marched through a swamp water 6 in deepe & marched \_\_\_\_\_ mile & formed in line of Battel in a Bad swamp tall grass & our cannon sheld the Rebs the cannon plaid nearley all day our companies yet \_\_\_\_\_ on picket last night it Rained I had no tent \_\_\_\_\_ Blanket Dec 11 \_\_\_\_\_ Sun morning our Battery opend this morning with 4 guns & was \_\_\_\_\_ to \_\_\_\_\_ 4 others the shells Birst all around my pickets \_\_\_\_\_ & one shell I dodged that cam up a forrow that I was standing severl shells Burst over my head firing eased about noon then we left our poasts & cooked Breakfast a shell Burst near whar we ware a cooking 1 piece fell within a ft of our fire we are on a 1 half Rashions 1 1/2 crackers for 2 days no sugar & but little coffee we had to live so far 10 days & all the way from Roame we only got 3/4 Rash but we gethered sweate potatoes \_\_\_\_\_ turnips & so we \_\_\_\_\_ the mosketoes Bit me while on picket Dec 10 fine \_\_\_\_\_ a good sort of the time I saw Boys offer 50 cts for 1 crackers yesterday I & BALEY for 4 chickens we eat 2 & give the Boys 1 Dec 12 we joined our Regiment last night we ware on 24 hr & then we ware \_\_\_\_\_ it got coald last night the ground froze a littel the cannon Boomed all a round to day one of our officers Capt. DUCKWORTH was Buried he was a fine man & liked By all that knew him wher we ware on picket their ware 25 \_\_\_\_\_ Ricks of Rise 12 steps long & 5 steps wide estinatd at 2500 to three thousand Bushels & it was of the first quality we lay in camp all day & washed & cleaned our guns Dec 13 fine morning this morning we had inspection of arms & laid still all day the cannon ware a booming all day to day fort McAlister was taken with 23 guns & some small arms & prisoners last night about 8 oclock we ware drawn in line of Battel but did more Dec 14 had a good night sleppe in our shanty cloudy this morning everything seams quiet picket firing all day Dec. 15 Cloudy & foggy all quiet

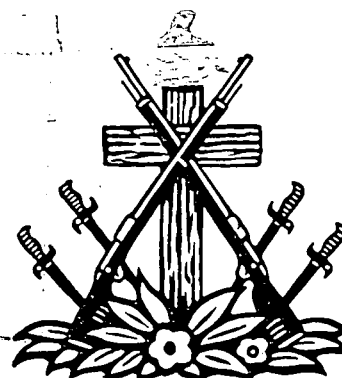

 marched 3 miles & campt at fort Brown \_\_\_\_\_ J eat some pork & turnips

 pushed a car to savanna & loaded it with lumber & puld it 3 miles to Build  
 quarters Dec 24 to day we ware on grand Review by the General Wm SHERMAN Dec 25  
 all quiet & we are a fixing our shanties Rained last night Dec. 26 Rained & muddy  
 to day 8 men of our Companies ware detailed to go to fort thunder for duty 4 miles  
 from camp Dec 27 we are at fort thunderboalt to day I was fishing for oysters &  
 \_\_\_\_\_ Enough for 2 good soups \_\_\_\_\_ partners Dec. 28 we had a nice Thunder shower & it  
 is nice & pleasant Dec. 29 cool & windy Dec. 30 last night a house4 Burnt down  
 Cool & windy all day Dec. 31 still cool & windy I got a letter from Charlotte  
 Sunday January 1 1865 fine & pleasant froze last night 2 all quiet Jan 3 to day  
 the 17th got on transports here & left down River Their ware \_\_\_\_\_ 10 boats here to  
 day the prisoners Comensed to Build wharf Jan 4 the soilders are still going down  
 the River Jan 5 to day I was detailed Back to the Regiment & I turned over may gun  
 & equipment & cooked for the officers Jan 6 Rained last night 7 to day our  
 Regiment is on grand Review Jan 8 Sunday to day our Boys drew near \_\_\_\_\_ 9 all quiet  
 in camp only duty & Rumrs about us leaving up to Jan 16 17 18 & 19 to day we got  
 orders to march & left camp to crost the River at savanna Rained all day & nearley  
 all night at night we Returned to our camp again Jan 20 we started again about day  
 light & crost the second pontoons & built Corderor Roads & Returned at night to  
 our coald quarters it is impossible for us to move as the teams swamped & it is  
 still Raining Jan 21 no more to day BAFS & OEHELTREE are in the hospital at

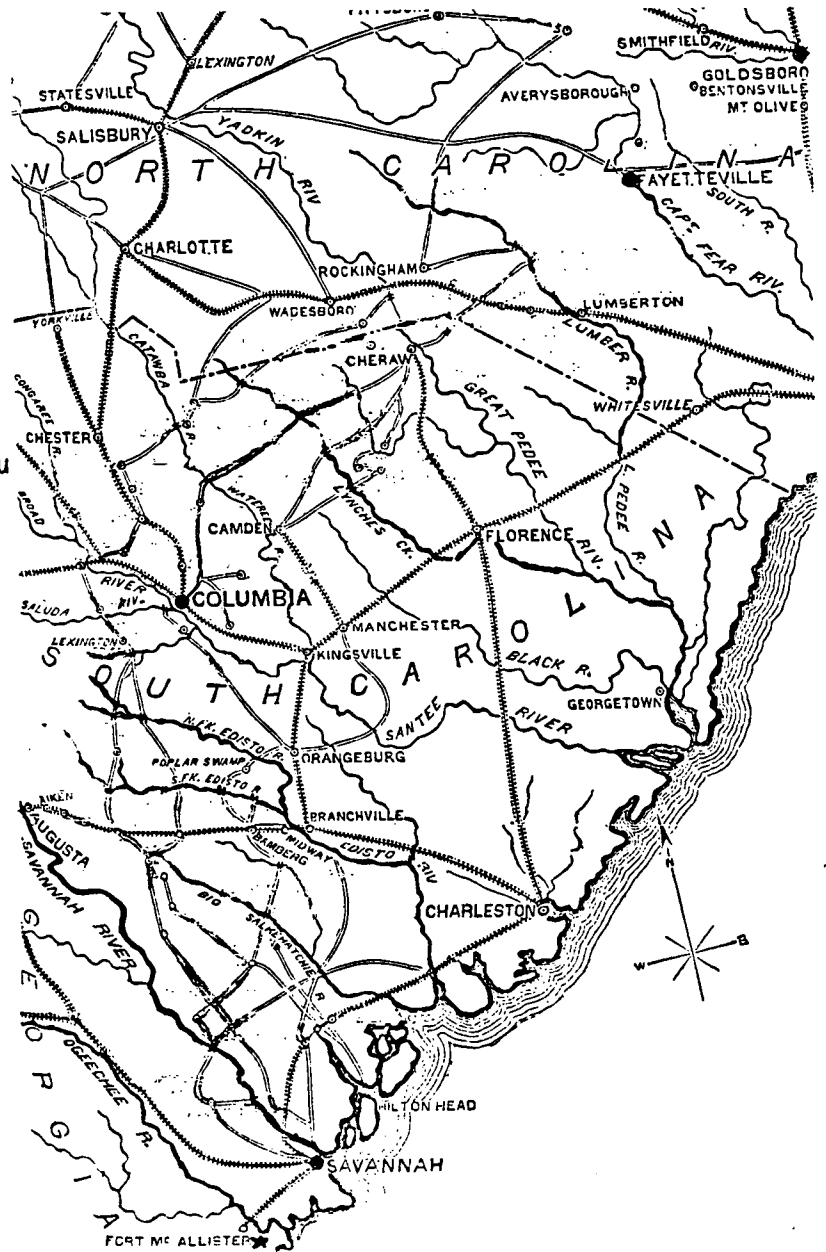

**FITCH FAMILY LETTERS AVAILABLE AT THE WATKINS COMMUNITY MUSEUM**

The March-April 1989 issue of the "Douglas County Historical Society Newsletter" tells us that in 1979, the great grandson of Edward and Sarah FITCH, Robert FITCH of Omaha, Nebraska, donated copies of fifty-five FITCH family letters to the Watkins community museum. A pamphlet containing these letters will be available for purchase at the museum. In addition, Roger FITCH later donated copies of one hundred letters from a FITCH family relative in Massachusetts, which may be viewed at the museum.

Edward FITCH came to Kansas in 1864 as one of the New England abolitionists who were determined to hold Kansas as a free territory. His letters home told of every day existence and of the alarms and dangers of border warfare during this period of crossborder raids between Kansas and Missouri. Edward was a schoolteacher for a while, then farmed on the outskirts of Lawrence, then moved back to town and worked in his father-in-law's bookstore. He was shot by Quantrill's raiders in his home in front of his wife and children, August 21, 1863. Sarah FITCH's letters to Edward's family, dated shortly after the raid, gave a graphic account of that horrifying event.

## IN THE MATTER OF THE PETITION OF JOHN N.O.P. WOOD

The following claim appears in "Kansas Claims," Volume 2 of Reports of the U.S. House of Representatives, 36th Congress, 2nd Session. The volume may be found at the Spencer Research Library at the University of Kansas, Lawrence, their call number 1107. Researched by the editor.

No. 436.

In the matter of the petition of John N.O.P. WOOD.

Douglas County, ss:

John N.O.P. WOOD, the above-named petitioner, being duly sworn, saith: I have sustained loss and damage by the taking and destruction of property during the disorder which prevailed in this Territory from November 1, 1855, till December 1, 1856; a just and true account is set forth in the petition and testimony now on file in this case; for which loss and damage I claim compensation, under the provisions of an act passed February 7, 1859, entitled "An act to provide for the adjustment and payment of claims."

Deponent further saith that during the fall of 1856, a large number of prisoners, commonly known and called free-State men, were arrested and held in custody of the existing civil and military authorities in Lecompton, in said Territory, during several months, a list of the names of which, together with the periods during which they were confined, as near as deponent ascertained or recollects, is as follows: all of said prisoners, viz: 109, were captured by the United States troops, by direction of Deputy United States Marshal CRAMER, pursuant to the order and authority of Governor GEARY, immediately after the battle of Hickory Point. Some of said prisoners were indicted for murder, others for various offences, all growing, as deponent believes, directly or indirectly out of the civil war that had then been prevailing in Kansas; said prisoners were virtually and in fact prisoners of war. The civil authority was subverted; the civil authorities were destitute of means wherewith to supply the wants and necessities of prisoners; there were no funds in the territorial treasury to pay expenses of keeping these prisoners; the United States troops, who served as a "posse comitatus" to aid in arresting said prisoners, refused to provide for them from the United States quartermaster's or any other department; the United States marshal declared that he was only acting in aid of the civil authorities of the Territory. On the organization of Captain DONALDSON's and Captain WALLIS's companies of militia, mustered into the service of the United States in September or October, 1856, said prisoners were turned over to said companies to be guarded and protected. Said two military companies were supplied with their rations by the officer in command of United States troops then stationed at Lecompton, but no supplies were furnished the prisoners. Deponent further saith that at the time said United States troops refused to provide for said prisoners, he, deponent, had, in the city of Lecompton, a large stock of provisions, groceries, and miscellaneous goods and items, such as charged in the schedule attached to deponent's petition, of the aggregate amount of about \$10,000. Deponent then resided in Lecompton, and was engaged in dry goods and grocery business; all said goods and property were the sole and absolute property of deponent. About this time deponent was applied to by the United States marshal to furnish all necessary rations for said prisoners, as it was not possible that they should be left to starve; no other person or persons in Lecompton or vicinity were prepared to furnish at that time adequate supplies for said prisoners; about the same time Governor GEARY, ex-officio commander-in-chief of the territorial militia, also requested deponent to furnish said supplies and rations; to do the best that could

be done for the comfort and convenience of the prisoners, and to deal out all such rations and supplies as might be necessary from time to time for said prisoners; deponent then and there, considering the unsettled and uncertain condition of affairs in the Territory, the danger of a renewal of warfare, that said prisoners, as free-State men, were actually prisoners of war in custody of their opponents; that the pro-slavery forces were destitute of provisions and other means for furnishing the necessaries of life to said prisoners; that the prisoners were so situated that natural laws were more potent than mere civil laws or rights of property; that humanity imperatively demanded that said prisoners be kept from starvation; that public policy and the peace of the Territory were the alleged motives for the arrest and detention of said prisoners; that the governor had determined to allay excitement and hostilities by substituting the forms of civil government for the anarchy that had so long prevailed, and that he had at his command a sufficient force to execute his orders; that the pro-slavery forces were not likely to permit their prisoners to wait for rations, even if they had to take the same by force, for, as prisoners of war, their sense of honor would impel them to forage for the support of their prisoners if necessary, while their own rations were furnished by the United States assistant quartermaster; such foraging it was evident would lead to opposition on the part of those upon whom the foraging demands would necessarily be made; opposition lead to resistance, resistance to collision, warfare, and a renewal of anarchy. All these considerations were pressed upon the attention and consideration of deponent by United States Marshal DONALDSON and Governor GEARY, who insisted upon this deponent to furnish these supplies; in addition, the marshal and Governor GEARY proclaimed that the United States government or the territorial government would be bound to indemnify deponent for any supplies so furnished; that said supplies must be had at all hazards; subsequently said deponent consented to furnish and did furnish the supplies and rations charged in said account or schedule, and every item thereof, to and for the use, comfort, and necessary maintenance of said free-State prisoners, and that said supplies were furnished under circumstances of absolute necessity, to which resistance would have been unavailing, and could only have resulted in further and heavier sacrifices on the part of deponent. Against such contribution deponent protested to said Governor and marshal, but finally consented to proceed therewith for a time. After a few days deponent refused to furnish some supplies from his store that had been sent for with a file of armed men belonging to said territorial militia to enforce the demand; in defending his property deponent had a fight with said armed men in his store; after which the governor came and urgently requested said deponent to furnish said prisoners and guards; this deponent saw the necessity under which he was placed; in said fight blows were struck with hatchets and other weapons, and wounds inflicted; after that he continued to furnish supplies upon demand to the amount of the kind and description in the aggregate as set forth in said schedule. This deponent further states that he was a citizen of Kansas during the years 1855 and 1856, and has been residing in the Territory ever since; he now lives in Lecompton. Deponent prays that all his proofs and papers, heretofore submitted to Commissioner STRICKLER, (a certified copy of which will be found hereto annexed,) may be taken and received as his petition, schedule, and partial proof in this case; that some of the witnesses, whose testimony was filed with General STRICKLER, are now absent from the Territory, and their personal presence cannot be obtained, viz: Mr. JOHNSON started some time ago for Pennsylvania, and James M. TUTON supposed to be in Linn county, Missouri, as deponent is informed and believes.

In the matter of the petition of John N.O.P. WOOD.

County of Douglas, ss:

William P. CALDWELL, of lawful age, being duly sworn, deposes and says: That he resided in Lecompton during the fall of 1856; I was one of the militia men mustered into the United States service, and it was made our duty to guard the free-State prisoners. These prisoners were kept in Doctor WOOD's house, now known as the National Hotel, in Lecompton; he supplied these prisoners with provisions, with stoves, fuel, beds and bedding, and clothing; these prisoners were kept in the house and supplied by Doctor WOOD about three months; never knew any one else to furnish supplies and provisions for the prisoners; don't think any one else was able to furnish the provisions; Doctor WOOD had a dry goods and grocery store; had a good stock of goods; Governor GEARY told deponent that he had got Doctor WOOD to furnish the supplies for these prisoners, such as provisions, clothing, bedding, stoves, fuel, &c.; also a house for them to stay in during the time these prisoners were kept in Lecompton; it was an absolute necessity on the part of Doctor WOOD to furnish the supplies to prevent an outbreak and forcible contribution, as there was a sufficient force to take violently all the provisions needed, and this deponent believes that if the supplies had been refused they would have been taken by force; this deponent knows that some armed men were refused supplies by Mr. JOHNSON, a clerk in Doctor WOOD's store, when an altercation took place; they came back to the storeroom with a file of armed men; about seven came into the store, and ten or more at the door; they attempted to take supplies by force; Doctor WOOD resisted; knocked some of the men down with a hand hatchet; it was supposed that he had killed one man; the armed men outside threw stones in the windows, doing considerable damage; Doctor WOOD, after this, let them have supplies.

James M. PELOT, after being duly sworn, deposes and says: That he was first lieutenant of company A, infantry, territorial militia, mustered into service of the United States during the fall of 1856; during the months of September, October, and November it was made the duty of said company to guard the "free-State prisoners." These prisoners received the usual "soldiers' rations," such as flour, coffee, bacon, and vegetables, and said provisions for the prisoners were supplied by John N.O.P. WOOD, from his store in Lecompton; he kept a dry goods and grocery store at that time; had a good supply of staple goods, and he was the only one in town at the time that had a sufficient supply on hand to enable him to furnish the free-State prisoners with provisions; the quartermaster's department at Fort Leavenworth refused to supply these prisoners from the public stores. There were no means at our command to supply these prisoners; there were about one hundred prisoners supplied by Doctor WOOD; no one else, to my knowledge, furnished these prisoners; he furnished them with (in addition to provisions) stoves and fuel.

The petition of J.N.O.P. WOOD, of the county of Douglas and Territory of Kansas, under the act of the territorial legislature, entitled "An act to provide for the auditing of claims," approved February 22, 1857:

J.N.O.P. WOOD, of the county of Douglas and Territory of Kansas, would respectfully represent unto the honorable commissioners: That during the year 1856 he was dealing in merchandise (consisting of provisions, dry goods, groceries, &c.) in the town of Lecompton, county and Territory aforesaid; that during the summer and fall of the year 1856 a large number of prisoners, amounting from eighty-four to one hundred and thirteen in number, were held in the town of Lecompton, Kansas Territory, by the United States marshal for the Territory of Kansas for various and different offences against the laws of the United States and those of Kansas Territory; and while held as aforesaid your petitioner furnished the said prisoners with boarding and lodging, and for number of prisoners, time of keeping, price, &c., you are referred to the schedule herewith filed, which is made a part of this petition; that a number of said prisoners were tried before the proper tribunal in Kansas Territory, convicted, and sentenced to hard labor in the penitentiary; and that after their conviction and sentence, as aforesaid, your petitioner furnished to the master of convicts of Kansas Territory (under whose charge they were placed) provisions, bedding, and clothing, amounting to seven hundred and fifty-six dollars and seventy-three cents, (\$756.73;) that during the summer of A.D. 1856 your petitioner furnished to the United States marshal, DONALDSON, and to other persons having command of the territorial militia engaged in the political difficulties existing in Kansas Territory at that time, provisions and other necessaries amounting to the sum of one thousand seven hundred and eighty-two dollars and eleven cents; and that during the winter of 1856, and at the time of the existing political difficulties, your petitioner lost, by having them stolen and forcibly taken from him by persons engaged in said difficulties, articles of merchandise and live property, amounting in the whole to five hundred and seventy-five dollars, and during the summer of 1856 he lost, as aforesaid, two saddles and bridles of the value of thirty-four dollars and fifty cents, as will be manifestly shown by reference to the schedule herewith filed; and interest on the same at the rate of ten per cent per annum for the term of two years, amounting to one hundred and twenty-one dollars and twenty cents, which, as in other cases, added to the whole, amounts to the sum total of seven thousand eight hundred and forty-five dollars and thirty-one cents, all of which your petitioner most respectfully presents.

WOOD as to the number of prisoners, the time of boarding, and the price charged for boarding; he states that he knows, from his own knowledge, that said WOOD furnished provisions and boarded the number of said prisoners, as therein charged,

from about the 22d day of September to 17th day of November, 1856, and that the price therein charged in said account he believes to be correct, and remains unpaid.

#### OBITUARY OF HON. B.F. DIGGS.

Taken from "The Kansas Monthly," Vol. III, No. 1, Jan. 1880, p. 20, at the Kansas State Historical Society Library, Topeka, KS. Submitted by Beverley Chapman.

Hon. B.F. DIGGS, of Lawrence died on the 16th instant, after a life of great usefulness. He was formerly clerk of this county, a member of the city council, and was for some time editor of the Lawrence Tribune. He was born in Indiana, February 13, 1827, came to Kansas in 1866 where he did the State great service, being an upright citizen, prominent in political and social life and a worker in every good cause. Mr. DIGGS will be remembered as a most excellent and useful man.

#### A FISH STORY

The Watkins Museum provided us with a story from the May 23, 1889 Lawrence Journal. The paper told of Clarence HOADLEY and Bob FLUKE who went fishing at Lakeview and came back "tired, hungry, sunburnt and as cross as two sticks" with a "single 'finney,' about 2 1/2 inches long." THE SIMON FAMILIES OF DOUGLAS CO., KS

Submitted by Mark A. HOOVER, 1573 Beverly Rd., Idaho Falls, ID 83402. He indicates that the parent document, available from him, has 18 pages of text with 55 references and 85 attachments. The attachments include copies of 64 Luxembourg birth, baptism, marriage, death, and miscellaneous records.

The SIMON families settled between Clinton, Douglas County, KS on the north and Overbrook, Osage County, KS on the south mostly in Marion Township, Douglas County. Their migration was from Junglinster, Luxembourg, a small village about nine miles northeast of Luxembourg City, over the last half of the 19th century and included members from the KRIER, SCHALBAR, SCHREINER, and THOME' families. They had been farmers in Luxembourg and continued in that occupation in America, no doubt attracted by the promise of peace and freedom and the availability of good farm land. Their hopes and dreams were not in vain as the families of each of the four immigrant SIMON children -- Mathias, Peter, Katherine, and Nicholas -- were to enjoy prosperity.

The parents of these four were Johan SIMON and Anna THORNE' (both born in 1810). The paternal grandparents were Michel SIMON and Catherine BRICHER (or BRICH/BRUCH/BRUCHER/BRUGGER). The maternal grandparents were Mathias THORNE' and Magdalena FELLER.

Attached is a summary of data for each of the four immigrant SIMON children, their children, grandchildren, and spouses where known. Of the 95 people listed 85 are known to have lived in Douglas County. The birth record of Katherine SIMON (C. on the summary), wife of immigrant Wendelin SAILE, is shown below. Wendelin and Katherine had a 20 acre dairy for many years on the south side of 23rd Street in Lawrence where the Ford dealership and Burger King are located today.

The compiler welcomes additions and corrections to this summary and has full documentation and references available for those interested.

UNDERSTANDING DATES IN THE OLD STYLE CALENDAR BEFORE 1752

Have you ever seen dates in old records like "Jan. 23, 1721/22" and been confused? Worse yet, have you tried to figure out which date was correct and then used that date in your family records? DON'T!!! YOU MUST RECORD BOTH YEARS!!!

In the Middle Ages, the Julian Calendar was used in Europe, and it became more and more obvious that it was inaccurate. By 1582, calendar dates were ahead of actual time by 10 days, so the present-day Gregorian calendar was created by the Catholics. Protestant England and its American colonies weren't about to adopt anything Catholic, so nothing was done in the British Empire until 1751, when the old calendar was 11 days ahead of the sun and Parliament finally passed an act to convert to the new calendar. The Act provided that in 1752, the second day of September would be followed by the fourteenth day. The date beginning the new year was also changed from the first day of Spring, March 25, to January 1. We can assume that before 1700 the Julian Calendar, or Old Style (O.S.) was used. (March was the 1st month, even March 1 through 24.) After 1700, the Gregorian Calendar, or New Style (N.S.) was gradually adopted, especially in legal documents and town records, although most church registers used Old Style until 1752. Therefore, between 1700 and 1752, a date between January 1 and March 24 should be written with both years. For instance, Jan. 23, 1721/1722 would be the 23rd day of the 11th month, 1721 in the old style, and the 23rd day of the 1st month, 1722 in the new style. It is not correct to use both years between March 25 and December 31, because under either system the new year had begun. It was and still is incorrect to change the dates prior to September 1752 into New Style, but people who lived then (and since) did do it, so beware. They also commonly added 11 days to their birth dates so they would not be 11 days older than they were. And don't forget to subtract those 11 days when figuring birthdates when you know someone's age that lived during that period.
