Children's Library

The children's library with its separate entrance on Vermont street has a collection of approximately 8000 well selected books. There is also a Modern Youth Collection in the main library which serves as a link between the departments.

The usual summer reading program was carried on with increased interest as shown through book circulation.

An outstanding service of this department the past year has been our cooperation with KFKU in their series of broadcasts sponsored by the Division of Dental Hygiene of the Kansas State Board of Health and the American Medical Association.

This program consists of a dramatization of a classic serving as a key book. Inserted in each broadcast is a message dealing with dental and health problems, at the same time developing an interest in good literature. In connection with the key book is a correlated list of books to be found in our library. Noting the calls at the desk for these books we realize the value of these programs.

Other services of the Library.

Transient service: a deposit system provides a simple way for visitors to our city to use the library.

Rural patrons: a fee of \$1.00 provided library service to a resident of the county who is not a city tax payer. A card is given to rural residents who are employed in the city.

University faculty members; a courtesy card is issued to those living outside the city.

Book reviews have continued with increased interest. The following friends have assisted with these programs; Mr. Snodgrass, Mr. Weatherbee, Mr. and Mrs. Hankins, Mr. and Mrs. Barr, Mrs. Chandler, Mrs. Pearson.
