# Report of the Librarian

TO THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE  
LAWRENCE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY:

Herewith is respectfully submitted my report of the work of the Lawrence Free Public Library during its ninth fiscal year ending December 31st, 1913.

The year 1913 has been one of much work, but of little accomplishment.

A delay in book orders and book binding brought the details of that work over into the active life of the school and club year. The work usually finished easily during the weeks of the shorter library hours, has been accomplished slowly and at great inconvenience, owing to the high pressure of reference work.

Because of these complications we have been obliged to omit this fall and winter the children's story hour, the library talks to the high school freshmen and much of the co-operative work with the high school teachers.

These various enterprises are so obviously a part of the business of a library that we hope for their re-establishment in the near future.

The circulation has played strange freaks. The statistics for the two years 1912 and 1913 are as follows:

With a gain of 849 in the adult department, and a loss of 786 in the juvenile department, the net gain for the year 1913 is only 63, with a total circulation of 48,867.

While librarians do not make the fetish of circulation statistics they formerly did, it is always of interest to know the reason for any change, either of loss or gain.

The gain in non-fiction circulation is satisfying and constant. This is due to the removal of all restrictions which regulate the issuing of non-fiction cards and

to the fact that many of the new books of literature and history, art and travel are written in a delightful and attractive manner.

The small gain in fiction circulation is directly due to the fact that the fiction listed in May, was not received and placed in circulation until the latter part of August, too late for the summer fiction reader.

The loss in the juvenile circulation began with the cessation of the story hour, in April.

The story hour which drew the children to the library, and created a desire to read has not been resumed; the long absence from the shelves of favorite books awaiting rebinding; only 200 new books to replace them; and the feeling of many parents that their children's reading must be limited during the school months, as the strenuous work of the modern school room seems all the small brain is capable of accomplishing—all these are good and ample reasons for the loss in the juvenile circulation.

The story hour as opened in the autumn of 1912, was continued until May 1st, 1913, with Miss Hannah Mitchell as story teller. Stories were told twice a week to children 5-9 and 10-12 years, respectively, with an average attendance of 45.

The story of the Quest of the Holy Grail, given as a serial, folk-lore, nature and fairy stories, all of a class to broaden and educate the attentive little listener, were told in a most attractive manner.

That the stories were not resumed this winter has been a great disappointment to the children who put the question over and over, "Won't you ever tell stories again?"

The accessions have numbered more than those of any previous year. The purchase of the Britannica and of the New International Encyclopedias added greatly to the value of our reference department.

Mr. Harry Dick and Mr. George Innes donated supplies.

Owing to the many cards issued to students and others not permanent residents it is necessary to re-register every two years. This was the registration year and since August 1st, when the new registration went into effect, there have been issued 2599 cards, 189 more than were issued in the corresponding time two years ago.

More and more of the K. U. students find their way to the Public library and take advantage of the indexes and periodicals as well as the fiction and small store of works on general subjects, such as economics, the sciences, history and literature.

As the first aim of a public library is to be all things to all people, we welcome each comer with an ever present desire to help, while the increasing demand on every branch of the library's resources proves the public has a growing confidence in our efforts.
